PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Greetings from McLean County,

As I write this message, I wonder where the summer has gone. We were fortunate enough to have worked all through the summer months.

ILICA was well represented at Decatur in the Partners In Conservation tent during the Farm Progress Show. Everyone braved the heat to educate show visitors on what it is that members of ILICA can actually do to aid in the conservation efforts of landowners.

Another very successful drainage workshop was also held in Decatur at Richland Community College with exceptional attendance. It is very satisfying to see this level of interest in continuing education and the interest in new products to make our jobs simpler.

As quickly as the summer months came and went, Lori and I were able to visit our daughter Jamie and son-in-law Daniel in Europe. We were fortunate enough to have our Jamie organize our itinerary, and let me just say, she did a great job. My first impression flying into Budapest was the abundance of



red tile roofs on all the buildings along with the absence of wood used in construction. Stone and masonry construction was the norm in most buildings. Obviously they are doing something right due to the age of the buildings, many of which are older than this country we live in.

Our son-in-law, Daniel, is stationed in Papa, Hungary at a NATO supported air base which is about two hours from Budapest. The area around Papa consists of mostly small acreages with a cropping mix of corn and sunflowers ... and a few vineyards thrown in for good measure. We did see evidence of subsurface drainage identified by manholes scattered out in the crop fields.

We traveled to Rome by plane and then to Florence, Italy by train. The photo (right) is of Jamie and me standing in the middle of the Coliseum. It is hard to believe that these ruins have been around for hundreds of years. One of the most exhausting parts of our trip was when Lori and I climbed 463 steps to the top of the Duo-



mo (Cathedral) to see all of Florence. It wasn't by choice, as we thought we were walking into the church sanctuary...wrong line. But none the less, it was one of the most beautiful sights I had ever seen.

The train trip from Rome to Florence took us through a bit of agricultural area showing extensive surface drainage on spacings of 80 to 100 feet in corn and soybeans. As you travel into the wine producing areas, you see what appears to be very rocky soil which may prohibit subsurface work in the lower elevations.

We recognized real quickly how wasteful we are in America. Very rarely did we find restaurants that had air conditioning, and yes, you can live with only 2 pillows on your bed and not the standard 7 pillows that we think we must have here in the states. The automobiles are much smaller than the ones we drive and small scooters are everywhere in the cities. It was my first experience with different currencies, so for 2 weeks I was not sure exactly how much money we were spending.

All in all, it was a great trip with lots of memories, and the best part of all was spending time with Jamie and Daniel.

With the fall work season beginning again, I hope that everyone has a safe and profitable season.





MEMORIAL TO CARROLL J.W. DRABLOS JUNE 12, 1930 TO JUNE 6, 2011



Many of ILICA's younger members probably don't remember Carroll Drablos or may not have even heard of him. However, Carroll was instrumental in developing one of the leading educational programs for land improvement contractors, which ILICA continues to benefit from even today. Kent Mitchell and Richard Cooke both worked

closely with Carroll, who undoubtedly had a profound effect on their careers. Carroll was an honorary Life Member of ILICA, and in honor of his great contributions to the organization, the following excerpt is taken from the official University of Illinois memorial.

Professor Carroll J.W. Drablos, internationally recognized for his expertise in Soil and Water technology, died six days before his 81st birthday in Champaign, Illinois.

Carroll was born on his parent's farm near Raub, North Dakota. His education began with four classmates in a one-room country school near the family farm. He received his BS degree in Agricultural Engineering in 1954 from North Dakota State University. During college, Carroll met Arlene Skjelset and they were married on September 13, 1953.

Carroll was commissioned as an officer in the United States Air Force upon his graduation. Following his military service, Carroll accepted a position with the Soil Conservation Service as an Engineer in Valley City, North Dakota. One year later, Carroll received an assistantship to work on a Master's Degree at North Dakota State University. After he finished his M.S. in Agricultural Engineering in 1958, Carroll accepted a research position at the University of Illinois. He was promoted to Professor in 1978.

Professor Drablos was a pioneer in the compilation and analysis of the interrelation of highway and agricultural drainage laws, and highway and agricultural drainage practices. The Illinois studies had an impact nationally and served as a model for changes in other states, and led to ASAE committee activity which had national impact.

Professor Drablos' studies on the strength of corru-



gated plastic drain tubing and methods of installation provided basic data used in developing ASTM specifications for this new material. These specifications had an impact nationally by assuring customers of a quality product.

Professor Drablos utilized his field experience and his educational skills to help develop one of the country's leading educational programs for land improvement contractors. Based on his field studies on plastic tubing he joined with colleagues in adjacent states to assure that drainage contractors knew how to install plastic drain tubing for long term use. The educational program was broader than drainage and encompassed all phases of soil and water engineered management practices. This program was geared in part to land contractors who apply practices to the land and led to the development of an award winning state association that served as a model for other states to emulate. Again, Carroll's programs had regional and national impact because of their quality and visibility.

Professor Drablos was a staunch supporter of the Soil Conservation Society of America and served in several positions, including State President. He was a leader in the American Society of Agricultural Engineers' effort to promote improved standards for highway and agricultural drainage. He served as Chairman of the Interrelation of Highway and Agricultural Drainage Committee and Chairman of the Design and Construction of Tile Drains Committee.

A registered professional engineer, Carroll received numerous honors and awards including seven ASAE Blue Ribbons for Educational Aids. He was honored with membership in Epsilon Sigma Phi, Gamma Sigma Delta, Sigma Xi, and the Overholt International Drainage Hall of Fame. He was an honorary member of the Corrugated Plastic Tubing Manufacturers Association, an honorary Life Member of the Illinois Land Improvement Association, and is listed in Who's Who in the Midwest and in Leaders in American Science.

Carroll was a member of Grace Lutheran Church and served in numerous leadership roles over his long affiliation with his church. Carroll loved to play bridge and was an active participant in the Ginger Creek duplicate bridge group in Champaign and a Silver Life Master. Attending Illini games and supporting the rebounders ranked high among his favorite pastimes. Most of all, Carroll enjoyed spending time with family and friends.

Carroll is survived by Arlene, his wife of 57 years; two sons, Scott (Kelly) Drablos of Dallas, Texas, and Craig (Kristi) Drablos of Tampa, Florida; and six grandchildren.

Then in December, Area 6 will host their first member meeting in the Mattoon area on Tuesday, December 13th. Since it will be our first visit to Area 6, the program will be provided by the Illinois State Police Commercial Vehicle Division on IDOT regulations for contractors. Bill Dean is working in finalizing the details of that event and more information will be available soon. That same week, the ILICA membership committee will return to Area 8 on Thursday, December 15th for a meeting in Norm Kocher's neck of the woods. Again, more detail will be available soon regarding the exact location and educational topic.

Of course, with January comes the ILICA convention in Bloomington, then February brings the national LICA winter conference followed closely by the ILICA winter workshop which will have a business focus in 2012.



Then, in line with our standard schedule, Area member meetings are scheduled again for the week of March 5th although they are still very early in the planning phase. Area 3 near Peoria and Area 5 are both being discussed as possible meeting venues with Tuesday March 6th and Thursday March 8th selected for the meeting dates.

LEGSLATIVE UPDATE: LICA PROMOTES AGREN CONSERVATION PLANNING TOOL

The letter below was personally delivered to the NRCS Chief, David White, by John Peterson under the direction of LICA President, Steve Gerten. Several LICA members have had the opportunity to view this planning tool through an on-line webinar and have been very impressed. See Steve's comments below regarding the benefit this software could provide to NRCS offices around the United States.

Dave Hurst was one of the members who viewed the on-line presentation and agrees that this software offers a welcomed change to current processes used in determining cost and design on many conservation practices. However, since this is not strictly a state issue, Dave recommended contacting the National LICA office to "respectively request that LICA develop a position statement for the federal level that ILICA and the other chapters could adopt for their respective state and local agencies." Dave's comments were presented at the September 10th board meeting along with additional information regarding the LiDAR technology used in this process.

Dear Chief White,

Recently members of The Land Improvement Contractors of America (LICA) have had the opportunity to use some computerized conservation planning tools that we believe could really help NRCS strengthen its core technical assistance function, giving landusers information and options they need to make sound conservation decisions. As budget cuts continue, and we are afraid they will, and NRCS staffing levels diminish, the need for conservation work and technical assistance continues. The planning tools we have learned of have been developed by Agren, a small company in rural Iowa. These computerized online tools coupled to LiDAR and intuitive GIS-based technology, help landusers quickly envision how practices such as farm ponds, grassed waterways, terraces and other structural practices will fit on their land, and within minutes they even have accurate estimates of the likely costs involved.

It is my understanding NRCS in Iowa is piloting the use of these Agren conservation planning tools, and have found them to be immensely helpful. IA NRCS officials we have talked to really believe these tools save them time and improve planning accuracy. Our LICA members who have used them see the significant time savings realized with their use. After some discussion, the board agreed that a unified approach to this matter would best serve everyone involved. Past LICA president Bruce Barnhart sat in on one of the Agren webinars and also saw the potential of



this software. He agrees that this is a good time to promote such a tool at the national level since the NRCS is currently researching new programs of this kind. Those that Bruce are aware of in Iowa however, are still cumbersome and far less efficient than the Agren and LiDAR system. Bruce supports the development of a National LICA position statement and putting their full support behind Agren and LiDAR.

Although everyone is at least starting to get busy at this time, the developers of Agren would be more than happy to set up another webinar for others to view this technology if there is interest. And they are also willing to schedule it in in the evening so it doesn't interfere with work hours. All that is required is a computer with an internet connection and a telephone of any kind. Once you are logged into the demonstration, you simply listen in via telephone while the host from Agren controls what you see on your computer screen. It is a very simple and painless process ... just as Dave Hurst!

Please contact the ILICA office if you would like more information about the Agren software or to discuss the possibility of another webinar. With dwindling field staff and funding for conservation programs, this technology might be just what NRCS needs to keep cost share programs going strong.

We also understand that Agren has proposed a national initiative with NRCS that would provide these tools to 20 field offices in 10 states, and ultimately could make these tools functional for NRCS's use nationally. The purpose of my letter is to encourage NRCS to work with Agren on this national initiative. As NRCS's partner since the 1950's, and as the organization representing contractors that have installed most of the nation's conservation practices on the land, we see these tools improving our system of conservation planning and installation even as resources dwindle. Please call on LICA if we might help as you evaluate this initiative. It will aid NRCS, cooperators, and our environment.



TAKING CARE OF SPRING-PLANTED TREES

When a tree is planted in the spring, there EXTENSION are high expectations that

it will become an integral part of the landscape, said a University of Illinois Extension horticulture specialist.



"How well and how soon that

happens starts with the tree's first several seasons in its new location in the landscape," explained Richard Hentschel. "A general rule for transplant recovery of a shade or ornamental tree is that it takes at least one year of recovery for every inch of trunk caliper. That can mean a two- or three-year recovery for a typical tree planted by a homeowner and longer if you have a professionally planted tree of a larger trunk caliper.

"Homeowners will need to take care of that transplanted tree until the tree completely recovers and resumes a normal annual rate of growth," he said.

Examples of a normal rate of growth can be measured by the amount of annual growth compared to the growth rate the first year after transplanting, the leaf size returning to normal, and a return of flowers if it is a flowering tree. The tree will spend much of the energy produced by the leaves to regrow and establish a root system for those first years.



"Providing plenty of water during those first years is very important," he said. "With a limited root system, watering is one of the most important things a homeowner can do.

"In the spring when we are having

cooler temperatures, the demand for water is reduced and there is usually adequate moisture in the soil from the spring rains. As the weather gets warmer, homeowners need to check the tree about once a week for water and then only water when needed."

With the roots in the root ball, both burlapped and container-grown trees, the surrounding soil may be moist, but there are no roots to take advantage of the soil moisture.

"If the root ball is dry, put enough water on the root ball area to thoroughly wet the entire ball," said Hentschel. "Ideally, this is done before any obvious wilting can be seen in the tree canopy.

"If there is a watering berm around the edge of the hole from the displaced soil when the tree was planted, watering is easier because the water stays where you want it and filling up the ring with the garden hose is easy. If there is



no watering berm, water slowly enough so the water stays around the tree and does not run off into the lawn or some other bed."

One way to extend the watering interval is to use a mulch layer 3 to 4 inches deep out past the root ball. This will conserve moisture and also keep the soil cooler, an environment favorable to tree roots. Keep the mulch ring loose so water will soak in rather than run off during a rain.

If the soil is heavy and has a tendency to hold more water or hold water longer, using a piece of plastic drainage tile with holes or slits placed vertically in the hole next to the ball at planting time can provide a way to remove excess water from the planting hole.

"This same tile also provides more soil oxygen to enter the root zone, which is an added benefit without any additional cost," he said. "There are trees lost every year from being overwatered."

As the fall digging season kicks off, don't forget the very important step of contacting JULIE for a dig request on every project on your schedule! The tips below are taken from the Excavator Handbook which is available online at: <u>http://www.illinois1call.com/free_materials/downloadable_items.htm</u>



Excavator Responsibilities:

Become a partner in damage prevention and follow these four important steps when planning any type of project that involves digging, regardless of the project size or depth. Before contacting JULIE, assess the route or excavation site; gather all information required for the locate request; and premark the location

of the excavation site in white paint, stakes or flags.

1. Call, Click or Fax Before You Dig

Excavators can reach JULIE anytime by calling 811 or 800-892-0123 or going online via E-Request (no training required) or Remote Ticket Entry (RTE) (training required). The Fax-a-Locate Program is another option, but requires 72-hour advance notice from the start of the work. For information, visit www.illinois1call.com. Within the city limits of Chicago, excavators should contact **DIGGER** (Chicago Utility Alert Network) at 811 or **312-744-7000**.

2. Wait the Required Amount of Time

According to the Act, excavators must notify JULIE at least 48 hours/two working days before digging. Also, make sure that the property is accessible.

When the excavation or demolition project extends past 28 calendar days from the date of the original notice, the excavator must provide a subsequent notice through JULIE that additional time to complete the project will be required. The notice provides the excavator with an additional 28 calendar days from the date of the subsequent notification to continue or complete the project

3. Respect the Marks


Each type of member facility owner uses a different color paint or flag to mark their underground lines. JULIE, Inc. neither owns nor marks any underground lines.

After receiving notification from JULIE, facility owners may use a combination of flags, stakes and paint when possible on non-paved surfaces and when dig site and seasonal conditions warrant. If the approximate location of an underground utility facility is marked with stakes or other physical means, the color code is employed:

RedElectric Yellow.....Gas, oil, steam, petroleum Orange.....Communications BluePotable water Green....Sewer PurpleNon-potable water (reclaimed)

4. Dig with Care

Excavators still must exercise caution when digging-always hand dig within 18" of marked lines.
