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

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


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#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



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# ILLINOIS PAID LEAVE FOR ALL WORKERS ACT TO TAKE EFFECT JANUARY 1, 2024

Employee Benefits, Employment Policies and Procedures, Illinois by Anthony J. Caruso Jr. & John D. Simmons, Wessels Sherman

On March 13, 2023, the Paid Leave for All Workers Act was signed by Governor J.B. Pritzker to take effect on January 1, 2024.

What employers are covered under the new law? Private and public employers with at least one employee. Also includes State of Illinois, local governments, and political subdivision employers.

#### What employers are NOT covered?

- Construction industry with collective bargaining agreement and related defined activities under the Act. Also, includes snow plowing and removal and refuse collection.
- Employers covered under paid leave/sick pay ordinances enacted before this law. For example, this would include the City of Chicago Sick Pay Ordinance and/or Cook County Sick Pay Ordinance with municipalities opt-in.

#### What employees are covered?

 All Illinois workers to include full-time, part-time, seasonable, or temporary workers whether salaried exempt or hourly.

#### What employees are NOT covered?

 College/university student employees or employees on temporary/short term basis as defined in the act.

#### What does the Law require employers to do?

- Paid leave for any reason to covered employees beginning January 1, 2024 or when employment begins, whichever is later.
- The amount of leave must accrue with at least one hours of paid leave for every 40 hours worked for up to 40 hours of paid leave for every 12-month period. This accrual counts all time that an employee actually works, including overtime hours, but does not include time when the employee is on paid or unpaid leave or otherwise noncompensable time.
  - ♦ EXAMPLE: Employee A works 15 hours per week, 52 weeks per year. Employee A is entitled to accrue 19.5 hours of paid leave annually. (15 times 52 = 780 hours worked per year. 780 divided by 40 = 19.5 hours of paid leave time).

- ♦ EXAMPLE: Employee B works 50 hours per week, 52 weeks per year. Employee B is entitled to accrue at least 40 hours of paid leave annually. Employee B's employer may choose to provide more than 40 hours, but is not required to do so.
- ♦ EXAMPLE: Employee C is paid on a salary basis and qualifies for the "administrative" exemption under the Fair Labor Standards Act. Employee C's office hours are regularly 37.5 hours per week, but in some weeks, this employee's work hours may be fewer or more, depending on workload. Employee C's employer requires employees to earn paid leave via accrual. Employee C's paid leave shall accrue on the basis of 37.5 hours per week, even in weeks when they work fewer hours.
- Accrual method: paid leave can be earned on a pro-rata basis with carryover, up to a maximum of 80 hours carried over. If the paid leave is front-loaded to the employee in at least the total 40 hour minimum, then no carryover is required.
- Upon separation of employment, the employer is NOT required to pay employees for earned/unused leave. However, if paid leave under the act is comingled into a common leave pool with vacation paid leave, sick paid leave, or any other form of paid leave, then it has to be paid out in the same measure as those other forms of leave. Best practice is to keep distinct books tracking any variable types of paid leave, and letting employees opt which type of paid leave they are utilizing.
- Upon re-hire of employee within one year of separation, employer must reinstate to the employee any earned but not-used paid leave.
- Penalties: If an employee is owed paid leave and disallowed from using it, the penalties are: the actual value of the disallowed leave, compensatory damages, a fine of between \$500 and \$1000, equitable relief, and a penalty to the Illinois Department of Labor of \$2,500 per offense.

#### What does the Law provide for Employees?

- 90-day waiting period prior to use of paid leave. This
  waiting period can be applied to both accrual and
  frontloaded paid leave.
- Request for paid leave can be oral or written for any reason. The employee is NOT required to provide documentation.

- The Employee must give Notice to the Employer
- If foreseeable 7 calendar days.
- If not foreseeable – as soon as practicable.
- The amount of pay under the leave is the employee's hourly rate plus tips and gratuities under the Act. The Act has special provisions for domestic workers.
- No waiver of employee's rights under the act can be required by the employer. It is against public policy under the Act.
- No retaliation by the employer against employee for taking leave.
- The employer CANNOT require an employee to secure a replacement while on leave.
- The employer can change the 12-month period with written notice to employees.
- The employer MUST allow leave in increments, which the employer can set to no greater than a 2 hour minimum increment, and only if the scheduled workday is more than two hours. If the employee's scheduled workday is less than two hours, they may restrict the amount of paid leave used per day to the equivalent of the scheduled workday.
- The employer MUST post a poster of the law which is provided by the Illinois Department of Labor.
- The Employer MUST maintain records for at least three years on paid leave.
- The Employer MUST provide notice to employees of amounts earned and used on the accrual pro-rata basis.

#### Denial of Paid Leave Requests:

- Must be provided in a "reasonable, written paid leave policy, made available in English and in any additional language commonly spoken by the employer's workforce that, at a minimum, includes the protections of the Act and is consistent with the provisions of the Act. A written paid leave policy, other than a qualifying pre-existing policy, that is inconsistent with the Act is invalid, and an employer with such a policy waives its right to notice of employee's use of paid leave time."
- The policy can be part of an employer manual, employer handbook, or a separate document.
- Grounds for denial:
  - ♦ The employer's policy for considering leave has been disclosed in writing; AND
  - ♦ The policy establishes certain limited circumstances in

- which paid leave may be denied in order to meet the employer's core operational needs for the requested time period. In considering whether an employee's request may be denied based on operational needs, relevant factors include:
- \* Whether the employer provides a need or service critical to the health, safety, or welfare of the people of Illinois; and
- \* Whether similarly situated employees are treated the same for the purposes of reviewing, approving, and denying paid leave; and
- \* Whether granting leave during a particular time period would significantly impact the business operations due to the employer's size; and
- \* Whether the employee has adequate opportunity to use all paid leave time they are entitled to over a 12-month period.
- ♦ The employer must provide to the employee and maintain a record of each request which is denied and the employer's reason for the denial.

#### Best practice recommendations for Employers:

- Check with payroll 3rd party vendor as to a separate employee account for paid leave.
- Decide on the type of company policy to comply with the law: PTO policy or self-contained Paid Leave Act policy.
- Decide on accrual method: front loaded OR accrual/pro rata based on hours worked.



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# HYPOXIA TASK FORCE RELEASES 2023 REPORT TO CONGRESS



The Hypoxia Task Force recently released its 2023 Report to Congress. The report describes progress made through activities directed by the Task Force toward attainment of the goals of the Gulf Hypoxia Action Plan 2008. This is the fourth Report to Congress since 2015.

The Task Force – EPA, its federal partners, Tribes, and 12 states along the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers – has taken steps to reduce the size of the Gulf's dead zone and will continue to work together to address this extraordinary environmental challenge. The Task Force is focused on implementing EPA's new Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Gulf Hypoxia Program, which provides \$60M over 5 years to implement the Gulf Hypoxia Action Plan. The Task Force is continuing to identify the highest priority nutrient source areas for conservation treatment, as well as estimating nutrient load reductions to help target resources to improve water quality for communities in the basin.

#### Below is the **Executive Summary** of the report:

"The Harmful Algal Blooms and Hypoxia Research and Control Amendments Act of 2014 (HABHRCA) directs the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator, through the Mississippi River/Gulf of Mexico Watershed Nutrient Task Force (Hypoxia Task Force or HTF), to submit a progress report to the appropriate congressional committees and the President beginning no later than 12 months after the law's enactment, and biennially thereafter.

This 2023 fourth Report to Congress describes progress made toward the goals of the Gulf Hypoxia Action Plan 2008 (Action Plan; USEPA 2008) through activities directed by or coordinated with the HTF and carried out or funded by EPA and other HTF members. This report provides updates since the 2019/2021 Report to Congress,

including federal and state actions and newly published science advancements.

This report is organized consistent with the structure of HABHRCA section 604(b):

- The HTF and an Assessment of Progress Made Toward Nutrient Load Reductions (Part 1)
- The Response of the Hypoxic Zone and Water Quality Throughout the Mississippi/Atchafalaya River Basin (MARB) (Part 2)
- The Economic and Social Effects of the Hypoxic Zone (Part 3)
- Lessons Learned (Part 4)
- Recommended Appropriate Actions to Continue to Implement or, if Necessary, Revise the Strategy Set Forth in the Gulf Hypoxia Action Plan 2008 (Part 5)

The HTF, its partners, and the scientific community have advanced the understanding of the hypoxic zone and many of the upstream, land-based factors that contribute to its annual formation. This report includes a summary of the current scientific understanding of projected climate change impacts on the Gulf of Mexico (Gulf), the status of the hypoxic zone in the Northern Gulf, and the delivery of nutrients to the Gulf from the MARB. HTF members continue to advance the scientific understanding of key topics including nutrient load quantification; nutrient source, fate, and transport in the MARB and to the Gulf; the resource response of the hypoxic zone and water quality throughout the MARB; and the economic and social effects of excess nutrients.

The HTF remains committed to its 2035 goal of reducing the 5-year average areal extent of the hypoxic zone in the Gulf to less than 5,000 square kilometers by 2035, with an interim target for reducing total nitrogen (TN) and total phosphorus (TP) loads by 20 percent by the year 2025. The 2019/2021 Report to Congress noted that recent science confirms that strategies to reduce both nitrogen and phosphorus by 48 percent are needed to meet the HTF's 2035 goal; that finding is reiterated in Section 4.2 of this

Report. Progress to date on reducing nitrogen loads has been strong: the Task Force has met is 2025 interim target to reduce total nitrogen loads by 20 percent. However, total phosphorus loads have increased. More work is needed to reduce nitrogen and phosphorus by 48 percent to meet the HTF's 2035 goal.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), Public Law 117-58, also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, provides a critical investment in strategies to improve water quality in the MARB and the Gulf and reduce the northern Gulf hypoxic zone. The IIJA includes \$12 million per year during federal SAN 10305 Executive Summary iv Fiscal Years (FY) 22-26 (\$60 million in total) for EPA to support implementation of the Action Plan. These funds provide equal support to the 12 HTF member states for development and implementation of their nutrient reduction strategies, with funding supporting the tribes with land in the 12 HTF state area of the MARB and other Action Plan partners. With the IIIA, all HTF states have the opportunity to upgrade their municipal wastewater treatment infrastructure with billions in additional investment through the CWA State Revolving Loan funds; some HTF states have also used support from EPA under the American Recovery and Reinvestment to upgrade municipal wastewater treatment plants. The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), Public Law 117-169, provides for significant investment in nutrient reduction activities on private lands, with \$19.5 billion nationally for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service to support climate-smart agriculture, including improving nutrient management opportunities. With this funding, USDA will target lands in need of conservation treatment, increase program flexibilities, launch a new outreach campaign, and expand partnerships to develop and improve nutrient management plans; in the MARB these funds will support Action Plan goals.

Accelerated implementation of nutrient reduction strategies throughout the MARB continues to be the HTF's primary path forward. In addition to the IIJA and IRA funding noted above, the work of the HTF is supported by technical and financial support from federal HTF members, including support through Farm Bill Conservation Programs, the Clean Water Act, the Water Resources Development Act, and other authorities and programs, with active participation by private sector, nongovernmental, and

other partners and stakeholders. The HTF engages a wide range of partners in the public and private sectors. As states and tribes implement their nutrient reduction strategies, they work with diverse groups including universities, agricultural associations, business councils, conservation organizations, municipalities, wastewater utilities, nonprofits, and private foundations.

The HTF continues to identify the highest priority nutrient source areas for conservation treatment using tools to target priority watersheds, inventory existing conservation practices, and estimate nutrient load reduction to help target scarce resources. The HTF is working to communicate successes to producers and their networks of trusted advisors to further build support for conservation investments. The HTF is sharing stories of success and acknowledging remaining challenges with the public. Better communication and engagement with the public is essential to sustaining and expanding the HTF's work.

This Report to Congress is one important tool for describing the HTF's progress toward reducing nutrient loads to the northern Gulf, amplifying state summaries of progress, sharing lessons learned in implementing nutrient reduction strategies, and adaptively managing strategies for improving water quality in the Gulf. "

#### Get Help





# Hazards of winter work: Cold stress


We always hear about warm temperatures and heat-related illnesses affecting workers. The usual culprits: heat exhaustion and heat stroke. But what about cold temperature hazards affecting workers? With major winter storms becoming a more frequent occurrence, these hazards should be top of mind for employers. During winter storm Elliott for example, many regions of the United States saw air temperatures reaching -20 degrees Fahrenheit or lower and at least 56 people are


estimated to have died as a result of the storm.

With climate change being a popular topic, we often hear about the concern of rising global temperatures. Yes, warmer temperatures do present a challenge, but how dangerous are cold weather events? Let's take a look at the annual number of deaths due to hot versus cold temperatures. According to the EPA, since 1979 there have been 11,000 deaths due to heat and 19,000 deaths due to cold in the United States. Annually, there are up to two deaths per million people and up to 2.5 deaths per million due to heat and cold, respectively. So, historically, cold has presented a much more severe challenge to people than heat.

Cold temperatures are a serious hazard facing workers that must brave winter conditions. OSHA indicates that there are three types of cold stress to be aware of and what to do in case you or another worker suffers from one of them. Here are the three:

#### Hypothermia

Hypothermia occurs when your normal body temperature drops to 95 degrees Fahrenheit or less. Other symptoms include shivering, confusion, slurred speech, slow heart rate and breathing, and loss of consciousness.

#### Frostbite

Frostbite occurs when body tissue freezes such as your fingers, hands or feet. Temperatures don't have to be below freezing for frostbite to occur if wind chills dip below freezing. Symptoms may include numbness, reddened skin with gray and white patches, feeling of firmness or hardness and blistering. Depending on severity, frostbite may result in amputation.

#### Trench (Immersion) foot

Trench foot is a non-freezing injury to feet. This injury may occur due to prolonged exposure to wet and cold environments. Symptoms include redness, swelling, numbness and the development of blisters.

Here are a few tips to prevent workers from being affected by cold stress:

- For non-emergency work, schedule work for a warmer time or day.
- Dress properly by wearing layers, insulated jackets, boots, gloves, etc. Clothing should not be tight fitting, so blood circulation is not restricted.
- Implement engineering controls such as trailers or shelters with heat sources available.

- Implement a rotation schedule with relief employees to limit time workers are exposed to cold temperatures.
- 5. Drink warm, sweetened liquids.
- Monitor yourself and other workers for the above listed symptoms and seek immediate medical attention if affected.
- Utilize the table below to determine shifts and break schedules depending on temperatures and wind speeds.
