GOP GOVERNORS URGE REAUTHORIZATION OF FARM BILL, CALL 2018 BILL "OUTDATED"

Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds, along with governors from 16 other states, signed a joint letter Monday urging Congress to reauthorize the Farm Bill and to provide "immediate financial assistance" to the agricultural sector.

"Our nation's agriculture industry is in trouble and if meaningful support is not provided soon, the well-being of the nation is at risk," the letter read.

The Farm Bill was last authorized in 2018, and after failing to reauthorize it on the typical five-year schedule in 2023, Congress extended the 2018 bill through the 2024 fiscal and crop year.

Congress failed again in the 2024 regular session to pass a new Farm Bill, which allocates funding for agricultural and food programs, including the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Now U.S. lawmakers weigh the option to pass another extension of the bill, or rush to finish a new version during the lame duck session, before final provisions of the extension expire at the end of the year and new members are sworn in on Jan. 3.

The group of GOP governors is asking Congress to pass a new version of the massive bill rather than extend the "outdated" 2018 bill another year.

The letter said the current farm bill has left farmers to operate "under a framework that is no longer viable."

The governors pointed to inflation, high input costs, high interest rates, natural disasters and agricultural trade deficits as "powerful headwinds" the sector has faced since the expiration

of the 2018 Farm Bill.

"Another year-long extension will leave farmers working under an outdated plan as they continue to face evolving challenges in today's agricultural landscape," the letter said.

In mid November, Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Michigan, chair of the Senate committee on agriculture, nutrition and forestry, issued an updated version of the "Rural Prosperity and Food Security Act" from earlier in the year that could serve as a new Farm Bill, if passed.

The updates include \$39 billion in new resources for farmers, families participating in the SNAP program and rural communities, according to its summary.


Republican lawmakers have been unsupportive of the bill, with reports of House representatives rejecting the it and Sen. Roger Marshall of Kansas calling it "not a sincere or transparent effort to address the urgent needs of rural America."

The governors in their letter urged Congress to fulfill "its obligation to protect and revitalize the agriculture industry before it's too late" by reauthorizing the bill rather than extending.

"If a country can't feed itself, fuel itself, or fight for itself, then it cannot survive," the letter read. "It is imperative that the United States not become dependent on other countries for our food supply, while we have the best farmers and ranchers in the world right in our backyards."

Governors who signed the letter include Reynolds, Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey, Arkansas Gov. Sarah Sanders, Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp, Idaho Gov. Brad Little, Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb, Louisiana Gov. Jeff Landry, Mississippi Gov. Tate Reeves, Missouri Gov. Mike Parson, Montana Gov. Greg Gianforte, Nevada Gov. Joe Lombardo, Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine, Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt, South Carolina Gov. Henry McMaster, Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee, Utah Gov. Spencer Cox, and West Virginia Gov. Jim Justice.

Grocery Shopping Tips to Save Time & Money

Grocery shopping may not be your favorite household task. It's often a mundane chore, yet necessary if you want to have food in the house to eat. Here's a few tips to save you time and money without sacrificing good nutrition.

 Get organized and plan ahead. Use a free grocery list app; many major grocery stores have their own app with this feature. As soon as you run out of a common ingredient, add it to the list. Check the stores for sales and check your fridge, freezer and pantry for items you need to use up. Look for recipes utilizing these foods and make your list!

- Buy canned and frozen fruits and vegetables to have on hand. Fresh doesn't last forever so supplement with no added salt canned veggies and buy canned fruits packed in its own juices. Look for frozen plain vegetables and fruits.
- Buy with convenience in mind, but only when it makes sense. Some stores are selling pre-cut fresh fruits and vegetables. Pre-cut butternut squash, which is not an easy one to slice, may be worth the extra money. For a household of one, buying small bags of popcorn so that it stays fresh for longer, may be worth the extra cost if you're having to throw out stale popcorn. However, many ready prepared foods are high in saturated fat sodium and may not be the most nutritionally sound options.
- Read the Nutrition Facts and ingredients label.
 Compare labels and go for the lowest amount of saturated fat, sodium and added sugars. When buying bread or other grains, look for the word "whole" as the first ingredient.



INTRODUCING NEWLY PUBLISHED ARTICLE: IMPACT OF SUBSURFACE DRAINAGE SYSTEM DESIGN ON NITRATE LOSS AND CROP PRODUCTION - NREC-FUNDED PROJECT

Subsurface drainage systems play a crucial role in improving crop yields by optimizing planting schedules, enhancing fertilizer efficiency, and removing excess water from poorly drained yet highly productive soils. However, these systems also contribute to significant water quality concerns by accelerating the transport of contaminants like nitrates into water bodies, leading to nutrient losses that severely impact ecosystems, including the Gulf of Mexico. In Illinois, where nutrient reduction strategies aim to lower nitrogen loads, refining drainage system design—especially tile depth and spacing—is essential for achieving a balance between water quality and agricultural productivity. From 2018 to 2023, the Department of Agricultural and Biological Engineering at the




Figure 1. The layout of the installed tile-drained fields and monitoring stations. CS-1, CS-2, CS-3, CS-4, CS-5, CS-6 are monitoring stations that collect water samples and gauge tile flow.

University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign conducted a comprehensive study, supported by funding from the Illinois Nutrient Research and Education Council (NREC-2018-3-360624-356). This article for the ILICA newsletter highlights the project, "Assessing Tile Depth and Spacing Impact on Nutrient Losses and Crop Production." This initiative provides critical insights into best practices for sustainable water management, helping Illinois farmers make informed decisions to reduce nutrient losses while maintaining high crop yields. This research has been conducted in a replicated tile drainage field experiment at the Agricultural Engineering Farm in Urbana, IL. During more than four years of the study period, a subsurface drainage system has been installed in a separated six fields with each 5-acre area in a farm (Figure 1).




Figure 2. Cumulative tile flow at each site from 2018 to 2022 (left) and drainage flow differences between plots analysed using Tukey's test (p < 0.05) (right) (Hwang et al., 2024).




Figure 3. Cumulative NO3-N loss at each site from 2018 to 2022 (left) and NO3-N load differences between plots analysed using Tukey's test (p < 0.05) (right) (Hwang et al., 2024).

This research investigates the influence of tile drainage depth and spacing on drain flow, nitrate losses (NO3-N), and crop productivity over a 4-year period in central Illinois. The study evaluated three drain spacings (40, 60, and 80 feet) and two drain depths (2.5 and 3.5 feet) across six plots managed under a corn-soybean rotation system. The configurations included plots with varying combinations of spacing and depth, providing a comprehensive dataset to explore how these factors affect agricultural water management and productivity.

The findings reveal that narrower drain spacings (40 feet) result in higher drain flow and NO3-N losses, whereas wider spacings (60, and 80 feet) demonstrated reduced drain flow and improved NO3-N retention. Seasonal trends in tile flow highlighted significantly higher drainage and nitrate losses during the non-growing season compared to the growing season. Interestingly, the plots with 80 feet spacing (e.g., CS-2) consistently showed better NO3-N retention and higher corn yields compared to those with narrower spacing (Figure 2 and 3). These results underline the potential of optimizing drainage configurations to reduce nutrient losses while maintaining or enhancing crop yields.

Corn yield data from the study further supported the benefits of wider drain spacings. Plot CS-2, with 80 feet spacing and 3.5 feet depth, achieved the highest yields, outperforming other plots by up to 13.6%. This result indicates that wider drain

spacings not only mitigate nutrient losses but also contribute to sustainable crop production. However, variations among plots with similar configurations, such as CS-4, emphasize the influence of site-specific factors like soil type, landscape position, and biochemical soil interactions on drainage performance and nutrient management.

The study concludes that while wider drainage systems offer significant advantages for both environmental sustainability and agricultural productivity, they may pose risks of temporary nitrate surges during high-drainage events. To address these challenges, the research recommends incorporating additional measures such as controlled drainage systems or bioreactors to manage nitrate losses effectively. Furthermore, the findings emphasize the need for extended field monitoring and modeling studies to refine the understanding of subsurface drainage design and its broader implications for water management in agricultural landscapes.

This comprehensive analysis not only demonstrates the critical role of drainage design in balancing productivity and environmental impacts, but also sets the stage for future research to optimize these systems for sustainable agricultural practices.





SAFETY FEATURE: MOBILE EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE

One of the most important elements contributing to the success of the land improvement contractor is the reliability and availability of your mobile equipment. Everyone knows equipment downtime directly relates to project delays that can jeopardize contractual performance obligations and adversely impact profitability. The good news is that unlike the weather, equipment downtime is something you can directly control by keeping your mobile equipment in tip-top operating condition by developing, implementing and managing inspections and preventive maintenance routines. It all starts with you!

Initially, preventive maintenance programs can be a monumental undertaking but, once implemented, they become ingrained in your business operations and workforce performance, and you reap the rewards. Luckily, most manufacturers and dealers provide preventive maintenance practices that can extend the life of your mobile equipment. While the manufacturers and dealers hope you return to them for preventive maintenance services after the initial warranty expires, most know they are less likely to retain your preventive maintenance business. What does this mean for you? It's up to you and your workforce to keep your mobile equipment in tip-top operating condition until you dispose of it. If you consistently observe routine and extended preventive maintenance practices, you should benefit from the extended life of your mobile equipment. And who doesn't want to maximize the return on their investment in mobile equipment?

Here are a few preventive maintenance practices to consider:

- Establish and promote a management and workforce mindset of prevention versus reaction.
- Continue the manufacturer's preventive maintenance practices for the life of the equipment.
- Develop an in-house preventive maintenance and tracking program for each piece of equipment.
- Develop a pre-startup inspection policy and practice for each piece of equipment.
- Determine which maintenance needs require immediate shutdown and maintenance.
- Create pre-startup inspection and maintenance-need reporting
- Train operators and supervisors to conduct pre-startup inspections to identify deficiencies.
- Require that equipment operators perform pre-startup inspections and document them.
- Audit operators pre-start inspections and mechanical repairs of in-house mechanics.
- Are there inspection practices specific to your business or industry? If so, include them.

Although each piece of mobile equipment will have individual preventive maintenance needs, here are some common items to include in your inspection list:

Fire extinguisher – is it present, securely mounted, workforce trained in its use, and is it discharged?

- Is operator trained and qualified to use the equipment?
- Operator cab/enclosure is it damaged and, if equipped, are environmental controls functional?
- Seatbelt if equipped, is it in good condition and functional? Do you have a use policy?
- Any damage to operator controls such as clutch, brakes, leavers, stick, etc.?
- Hydraulic hoses are there any visible cracks, wear or leaks?
- Hydraulic reservoir, pump, valves and actuators are any damaged or leaking?
- Is there damage to any moving parts such as tires, tracks, bucket, boom, hook, hoist, etc.?
- Is the equipment beyond its prescribed hours-of-use preventive -maintenance schedule?
- Are lights, horn and safety equipment in good condition and functional?
- Are the weather and job site conditions conducive for safety and damage-free operation?

Let's not forget about theft and mischievous damage prevention. If your equipment is stolen or damaged, it can be a setback for your project and a financial hardship for you and your workforce.

Here are a few prevention questions to ask yourself:

- Is your mobile equipment insured?
- Do you keep it insured to value?
- Do you have theft and damage practices in place?

Theft and mischievous damage prevention practices should include but are not limited to:

- Do not leave mobile equipment on site any longer than required to complete the job that equipment is needed for.
- Do not leave the haul trailer on the job site.
- Install telematics with startup and tamper detection and GPS tracking with active monitoring and notification.
- Remove operators key and secure cab and controls.
- Change the operator key, if possible, to avoid master key use.
- Install hidden kill switch.
- Remove battery and tire to immobilize equipment.
- Use fencing and lighting to deter theft or damage.

As a closing thought, mobile equipment does and will fail, sometimes unexpectedly, but a well thought out and implemented preventive maintenance programs and end-of-useful-life management can minimize the impact.
