NRCS ILICA - NRCS Natural Resources Conservation Service ANNUAL MEETING

On March 26th, 11 ILICA contractors met with State Conservationist Bill Gradle, State Conservation Engineer Ruth Book and Farm Bill Coordinator Paula Hingson at the State NRCS office in Champaign. This annual meeting provides an opportunity for ILICA contractors, who work directly with landowners utilizing NRCS cost share programs, to discuss issues they encounter while putting practices on the ground.

The topics on this year's agenda were submitted by ILICA board members and included discussions on seeding date specifications, standards on the reworking of existing terraces, tile size limits on funded waterway tile projects and Highly Erodible Land (HEL) tract qualifications. All ILICA members are encouraged to submit their concerns at any time during the year and are also welcome to attend the meeting, normally scheduled sometime in March.

One of the changes that has taken place as a direct result of this annual meeting is "foregone income payments" which provide cost share on **double** the acres required to construct a waterway. This allows our contractors to schedule the installation of a waterway during the growing season instead of



being pressed to do every waterway before planting or after harvest. These payments are designed to cover lost income on the few acres taken out of production while our contractors get the work done, allowing for seeding to be done according to NRCS specifications, which is so important in this practice.

Illinois NRCS and ILICA have published a joint press release, available on our website, promoting foregone income payments to encourage landowners to take advantage of the funding available. ILICA contractors are encouraged to share the press release with the landowners they think could benefit from the program.

If you have any questions about this or any other NRCS cost share program, contact your district conservationist. That's why they're there.!

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: TAXPAYERS FUNDING UNIONS

Recently Washington Examiner editorial writer Matt Hemingway wrote an excellent

series about sweet deals for unions from taxpayers. Since LICA has position papers on card check and other union issues, this information should be of interest. I will try and summarize one disturbing activity. I have written about Project labor Agreements (PLA's) before.

The recent Annual Report of the White House (I'll bet you didn't know houses could write reports) Task Force on the Middle Class turned out to be an appalling smorgasbord of payoffs to politically influential labor unions. Nowhere is the report's doublespeak dishonesty more evident than in the section on "Responsible Federal Contracting."

Responsible Federal Contracting really means "big money for big labor." More specifically it means one item on the union wish list in particular, "high road" contracting policy. Federal contracts would not go to the lowest bidder, but to companies that pay a "living wage" and meet other criteria, all defined by the government of course.

The Associated Builders and Contractors, which represents about 25,000 mostly non-union contractors, said "high road" contracting policy could increase the cost of each contract by 20 to 30%. About \$500 billion in federal contracts are awarded each year. In other words the administration wants to rig federal contract criteria to that unions will both be favored in the contracts, and then also be paid more for the privilege.

According to the Task Force Report, currently there are "inadequate controls" on the firms that get federal contracts, notably those with "substandard wages and benefits." That rationale is based on the charge that "contractors can pay their employees so little that they will have to go on welfare just



to survive." Can you believe that? That is absolute union (and administration) nonsense.

The Report also spends 2 pages advocating for the card check legislation that LICA opposes. Who does the White House Middle Class Task Force think will pay for all this union largesse? It looks to me as if the \$400 million that unions spent electing officials in 2008 will have gotten them billions in exchange, mostly from us middle class taxpayers. Some senators have written to Peter Orszag, director of OMB about this matter, but not surprisingly he has not responded, and I doubt that he will. Rotten business in my view.

DRAINAGE WORKSHOP AGENDA AUGUST 10 - 12, 2010

Due to the big response from area contractors to the March drainage workshop in Champaign, an additional workshop has been set for Champaign this August. The first two days will cover the same information presented at the survey and design sessions in March with the third day dedicated to more advanced drainage topics.

Topics for the survey and design days are: Understanding Latitude/Longitude; Introduction to GPS; Laser Guided Land Leveling; Field Session - Laser surveying; Excel Lat/Long Converter; Field Data Analysis; Drainage Design, Drainage Coefficients; Soil Properties, Illinois Drainage Guide and Resource Mgmt. Mapping Service.

The advanced drainage class will include **RTK** and **AGPS Mapping & Machine control technologies and the** possibility of a water table control structure installation at the South Farm.

To accommodate more attendees, the class venue has been moved to the I-Hotel, which also provides a wireless internet connection in the conference space. It is within 2 miles



of the university's South Farm and the hotel will provide shuttle service to the site for all attendees at no extra charge. A room block has been secured at the I-Hotel running \$125 per



night, (normal pricing is \$145) however, there are many hotels in the area that may be more reasonably priced.

Please note that laptops will be VERY helpful for the survey and design workshop and that parts of both drainage sessions will be held outside so plan to dress accordingly. All sessions qualify for CEU for the ILICA certification program.

Expecting a similar response from area contractors as seen with the drainage workshop, our first erosion control workshop will also be held at the I-Hotel, providing a larger venue while furnishing free shuttle service to the South Farm for the field exercise sessions. Dr. Kalita has the first module, which is mandatory for the program, completed and in the hands of IDOT for their approval. Once classes conclude next week, he will focus all of his attention on completing the other 4 modules and installing the rain simulator over the berm. By

the time our contractors arrive in Urbana for the August workshop, Dr. Kalita will have completed his "pre-beta" run through with engineers, contractors and IDOT personnel to evaluate the program and recommend any changes, prior to the first formal session.

The Fundamental Module covers the basics of all the topics that are covered in-depth in the other modules. This overview is mandatory before taking the other modules and will include erosion and hydrology, regulations for storm water pollution protection, sediment and erosion control, the design and maintenance of practices and inspections. Although the module can be covered in one long day, the ILICA workshop will provide additional time for the field session and allow more time for discussion during the classroom portion. The tentative agenda is listed below and the registration for both August workshops can be found on the following page.

STATUS OF THE PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE ILLINOIS PRIVATE SEWAGE DISPOSAL CODE

The seemingly never-ending saga of the proposed changes to the Illinois Private Sewage Disposal Code is still staggering forward. The Illinois Department of Public Health has spent the last 10 years or so trying to draft a new Code that can get the approval of the legislature. Originally, the Illinois Private Sewage Advisory Commission was established to provide input from various interest groups for recommended changes to the Code. However, the Commission was never very effective (they didn't play well together) and has not been seen for the last few years. Interestingly enough, the Commission has a legal mandate from the Legislature to meet at least semi-annually.

Last week, Chad Moorman of the Illinois Department of Public Health, met with the Illinois Association of Local Environmental Health Administrators (IALEHA) to discuss the status of the proposed Code changes. Although, IDPH supposedly cannot provide copies of the proposed changes, Mr. Moorman did advise the members of IALEHA that the Department did receive over 250 comments on the last proposed draft. Based upon those comments, IDPH did make some changes. For example, operational permits will not be required; and, the homeowner will be required to keep copies of their maintenance records.

According to Mr. Moorman, the proposed draft of the Code in currently sitting on the Governor's desk and will be reviewed by the State Board of Health at their June meeting. Following the Board of Health meeting, the proposed draft of the Code will be sent to the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR) for first notice. At this time, the draft will be published and will be available for public comment. OWPI anticipates that we will have a link to the proposed Code changes on our website: www.owpi.net.

Although it seems apparent that IDPH has made little, if any attempt to solicit input from individuals and groups who will be affected by the new Code, it is important that everyone involved with the on-site program read the proposed changes and forward your comments to JCAR. A list of the members of JCAR is included with this article. Historically, JCAR has been very receptive to comments they receive. This will also be the time for a public hearing to be requested in order to voice your opinions verbally.



contingent upon lease terms. They include: Quad Cities, Rockford, Countryside, East Peoria, Springfield, Champaign and Edwardsville.

Decisions regarding civil service employees will be determined after multi-county partnerships and program priorities have been established. Furthermore, it is anticipated that the number of educator and administrative positions will be reduced. too.

Extension has asked county directors to propose a unit configuration by May 10. By May 19, Extension will notify county directors of acceptance or change in the proposal. By June 10, educators will be notified of their new office location. And by June 15, county directors will submit FY11 budgets.

Governor Pat Quinn proposed a state budget on March 10, 2010. Extension funding was cut \$5.56 million in this proposal, which is the first step of what will be a very complicated budget process.

U of I Extension's FY09 budget is about \$65 million, supporting about 800 people of all job classifications from the director to secretarial staff in local offices as well as full- and part-time staff. This budget comes from federal, state and local levels: 18 percent federal, 21 percent local counties, 46 percent state, and 15 percent grants and revenue-generating activities.

U of I Extension has a 90-year history of connecting the citizens of Illinois to their land-grant university by providing educational programming around the state. More than 260,000 youth participate statewide in the popular 4-H program. There are more than 4,000 Extension Master Gardeners in the state. Extension also offers educational programs in the areas of nutrition, family economics and agriculture.

To address unprecedented cuts in state funding, University of Illinois Extension announced today a restructuring plan, including a consolidated administrative structure, closing

"In our public meetings, we heard loud and clear from our clientele how much they value Extension programming and our local presence," said Robert Hoeft, interim director of U of I Extension. "This new plan will maintain a local presence in every county."

He says the restructuring addresses financial constraints, but also provides for a continuation of what Extension is known for -- research-based, high-impact programs meeting changing societal and personal needs.

Extension's goal is to administer local county programming from 30 units of at least three but not more than five counties, reducing the number of county director positions by 46, which will make funds available to support programs. In anticipating the restructuring, Extension has held open many county director positions, so the actual number of people affected by these cuts will be far fewer than 46. Cook County will remain as a single-county program.

The minimum staffing for the proposed units will consist of a county director, a unit secretary, three educators and a position to manage volunteers.

Furthermore, Extension plans to close several of its center offices, which house Extension educators. The following centers will close on or about June 30, 2010: Carbondale, Effingham, Matteson, Macomb and Mt. Vernon. The educators, housed in these centers, will be moved to county offices.





SAFETY FEATURE -HEARING PROTECTION

Noise is unwanted sound that can effect job performance, safety, and your health. Psychological effects of noise include annoyance and disruption of concentration. Physical effects include loss of hearing, pain, nausea, and interference with communications when the exposure is severe.

Hearing protection is essential when noise exposures can't be controlled at their source. Both earplugs and earmuffs provide a physical barrier that reduces inner ear noise levels inner ear and prevent hearing loss from occurring. However, people often resist wearing these or use them incorrectly.

Employees resist wearing hearing protection more than any other type of personal protective equipment. One reason is, they don't think they really need it. But hearing loss occurs so gradually (even in intense exposures) that by the time you notice it, irreversible damage has already occurred. Another reason for not wearing hearing protection is that it can feel uncomfortable. Sometimes workers "spring" the muffs so they don't seal properly against the head, or snip off the inner portion of ear plugs leaving only the outer end to fool their supervisor. If you feel the need to do this, see your supervisor about obtaining a different type or style that fits you correctly and comfortably.

Slight initial discomfort may be expected when a good seal between the surface of the skin and the surface of the ear protector is made. The amount of protection you obtain depends on obtaining a good seal and even a small leak can substantially reduce the effectiveness of the protector. Remember to check the seal several times each day. Protectors - especially ear plugs - have a tendency to work loose as a result of talking or chewing, and must be resealed occasionally.

Properly designed, fitted, and clean ear protectors will cause no more discomfort to most workers than wearing a pair of safety glasses. Earplugs are made of soft material such a neoprene to prevent injury to the ear canal. Skin irritations, injured eardrums, or other adverse reactions from using ear plugs are very rare if they are kept reasonably clean.

There are many different styles, types, and brands of ear protectors available, but when correctly fitted, they all provide similar levels of protection. The best hearing protector for you is one that fits correctly so that you can wear it properly.

Some signs that you should be wearing hearing protection include:

- If it is necessary for you to speak in a very loud voice, or shout directly into the ear of a person to be understood, it is likely that the noise level is high enough to require hearing protection.
- If you have roaring or ringing noises in your ears at the end of the workday, you are probably being exposed to too much noise.
- If speech or music sounds muffled to you after you leave work, but it sounds fairly clear in the morning when you return to work, you are being exposed to noise levels that are causing a temporary hearing loss. In time, this can become permanent if you do not take care.
