

CRAB MEAT CANAPES

1 stick butter 1 tsp garlic powder 1 can crab meat 1 ½ tbs mayo

5 oz jar Old English cheese 1 pkg English muffins

Mix all ingredients and spread on 12 English muffin halves (not toasted). Freeze on cookie sheet for 15 minutes. Remove from freezer and cut into quarters. Return to freezer on sheet and freeze. Place in plastic bag. When ready to serve, remove from freezer and bake at 350 degrees for 15-25 min.

TEXAS ROADHOUSE CINNAMON BUTTER

Those who attended the summer National LICA meetings in 2010 in Peoria are aware of what an outstanding facility this is. Visiting LICA contractors were able to operate





ACTION ON AMENDING THE PWA TO EXCLUDE COST SHARE PROJECTS

Rich Nichols and Lonnie Wilson of the Association of Illinois Soil & Water Conservation Districts (AISWCD) both spoke at this year's partner reports at convention and attended the member meeting that afternoon. Rich and the AISWCD have taken the lead in the battle to exclude cost share conservation projects from the Prevailing Wage Act (PWA). Working with the county SWCD offices and our contractors, Rich has tried to document the impact this regulation has on state cost share dollars, erosion control practice installations and the economy around Illinois. Recent developments bring some hope that someone is beginning to listen.

Initially, HB3094, sponsored by Tom Tryon was assigned to the labor committee asking for all projects of \$20,000 or less be exempt from the Prevailing Wage Act. This wasn't really what we were looking for but it would be better than nothing. Plus, a shell bill can be amended to include the desired language at almost any time up to adjournment.



However, on Thursday, February 9th, Rich sent an email stating that Representative Reis entered HB5366 the day before, asking to exempt the cost share program entirely from the prevailing wage act. Rich copied the section of the act and the language proposed for amendment, which appears below.

The potential negative impact of the PWA to our contractors is very real. If the contractor is not aware that a job is subject to prevailing wage, doesn't bid or charge for the job considering those elevated cost factors and is later notified by Illinois Department of Labor (IDOL) that it involved state funding, the contractor is responsible for paying the additional wages plus any fines assessed by IDOL. Since prevailing wage can increase the cost of a job by as much as 30%, this could be a devastating blow to a contractors bottom line.

The AISWCD has, with our prompting, agreed to lead the charge on this legislative change but they need our contractors help. If you can document the costs of a state cost share project before PWA, compared to what it would have cost with this regulation in force should send that information to the AISWCD office. If Rich can show that the PWA has escalated the cost of applying conservation practices by X% which reduces the money available for conservation practices by X%, resulting in less conservation practices being put on the land, he thinks he can get the environmental groups on our side of this issue as well. HB 5366 - To Amend PWA to exclude cost share program:

Public works" means all fixed works constructed or demolished by any public body, or paid for wholly or in part out of public funds. "Public works" as defined herein includes all projects financed in whole or in part with bonds, grants, loans, or other funds made available by or through the State or any of its political subdivisions, including but not limited to: bonds issued under the Industrial Project Revenue Bond Act (Article 11, Division 74 of the Illinois Municipal Code), the Industrial Building Revenue Bond Act, the Illinois Finance Authority Act, the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority Act, or the Build Illinois Bond Act; loans or other funds made available pursuant to the Build Illinois Act; or funds from the Fund for Illinois' Future under Section 6z-47 of the State Finance Act, funds for school construction under Section 5 of the General Obligation Bond Act, funds authorized under Section 3 of the School Construction Bond Act, funds for school infrastructure under Section 6z-45 of the State Finance Act, and funds for transportation purposes under Section 4 of the General Obligation Bond Act. "Public works" also includes (i) all projects financed in whole or in part with funds from the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity under the Illinois Renewable Fuels Development Program Act for which there is no project labor agreement; (ii) all work performed pursuant to a public private agreement under the Public Private Agreements for the Illiana Expressway Act; and (iii) all projects undertaken under a public-private agreement under the Public-Private Partnerships for Transportation Act. "Public works" also includes all projects at leased facility property used for airport purposes under Section 35 of the Local Government Facility Lease Act. "Public works" also includes the construction of a new wind power facility by a business designated as a High Impact Business under Section 5.5(a)(3)(E) of the Illinois Enterprise Zone Act.

"Public works" does not include work done directly by any public utility company, whether or not done under public supervision or direction, or paid for wholly or in part out of public funds. "Public works" does not include conservation projects or practices on private land paid for wholly or in part out of public funds. "Public works" does not include projects undertaken by the owner at an owner-occupied single-family residence or at an owner-occupied unit of a multifamily residence.

New Firewood Website Helps Buyers Avoid Troubles by the Truckload

You see the ads in the newspaper, along roadsides and just about everywhere else at this time of year: FIREWOOD FOR SALE.

Knowing where your firewood comes from can keep you from making some costly mistakes, according to Duane Friend, a University of Illinois Extension Educator in Environmental and Energy Stewardship based in Jacksonville.

Friend is the co-author of University of Illinois Extension's new Firewood in Illinois website, http://web.extension.illinois.edu/firewood/

"With Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) showing up in more Illinois counties, it's best to buy your firewood from trusted local sources if you possibly can," Friend said. "If it's not locally sourced, or from a reputable seller, you could end up buying troubles by the truckload."

The Illinois Department of Agriculture urges that firewood be produced, distributed, sold and burned locally to prevent the spread of EAB, an insect pest that kills ash trees.

Friend offers a few additional tips for people who are in the market for firewood:



- Ask the seller where the wood came from, and what kind
 of wood it is. Oak, hickory and ash are some of the best
 firewoods. All woods produce the same amount of heat
 per pound of weight, but some woods are denser than others, and denser woods provide more heat by volume.
- Find out how long the wood has been seasoned (allowed to dry). Firewood should be seasoned for six to nine months prior to burning, to remove moisture that sacrifices energy and produces smoke. Small cracks in the ends of the wood pieces are a sign that the wood has been seasoned.
- Be sure the length of the wood pieces will fit your fireplace or stove.

- Check the diameter of the logs. Splitting larger-diameter pieces may be necessary – and many homeowners do not have the tools they would need to split larger pieces of wood
- When storing firewood, keep the pile covered and off of the ground, and avoid direct contact with buildings.
- Friend notes that it is easier to start a fire with some types
 of wood than others, and some woods produce more
 sparks than others. For example, osage orange wood creates many sparks as it burns, so it may not be the best
 choice for use in a home fireplace. The website includes a
 handy chart that shows which woods ignite more readily
 and which ones tend to produce a lot of sparks.

It is not always easy for people to tell how much wood they are actually buying or selling, said Dave Shiley, Local Food Systems and Small Farms Educator with U of I Extension, based



in Charleston. Shiley co-authored the website with Friend.

Most firewood is sold by the "cord," but Shiley says few people know exactly what that means. A standard cord contains 128 cubic feet of wood, but buyers may be getting closer to 80 to 90 cubic feet, due to the space between pieces.

"Both buyers and sellers sometimes use the words 'rick' or 'facecord' interchangeably with 'cord,' sometimes we find that people who buy a rick or a facecord don't actually get a full cord of wood."

Some buyers – and even some sellers – have hard time visualizing how much wood is in a cord. Shiley said the website includes information that firewood sellers will find useful, too.

A standard-size pickup truck with wood randomly thrown in to the top of the bed will equal about one-third of a cord, Shiley said. If the wood is neatly stacked, the amount of wood will be closer to one-half of a cord. Buyers can determine the volume by multiplying the wood pile's length by width by height.

"But that only gives you an accurate measure if the wood is neatly stacked without a lot of excess space between pieces," Shiley said. "That doesn't necessarily mean people should avoid buying a truckload of locally sourced wood that isn't neatly stacked. They just need to understand what they're buying."

Statewide Pre-Marking Guidelines for Excavators




The use of white marking products (i.e. paint, flags, stakes, whiskers or a combination of these) may be used to identify the excavation site by excavators. Black paint may be used when snow is on the ground.

- All Pre-marks should be placed prior to contacting JULIE.
- Pre-marks clarify (narrow) the scope of the request but can never expand the scope.
- Width of each mark should be approximately 2".
- Length of each mark should be approximately 6" to 12".
- Distance between marks depends on site conditions, but no greater than 20'.
- Company identification painted at reasonable intervals to allow quick identification.
- Default radius of stake is 10' default path width is 20'.
- Pre-marks that box in the excavation are limited to that box (unless specified otherwise on that request).

MARKING SAMPLES

Single Stake Pre-markings Center Point of Excavation Site


When an excavation site is contained within a 50' radius or less, it can be delineated with a single stake that is positioned at the proposed center of the excavation. If the excavator chooses this type of delineation, they must convey that they have delineated the excavation site with a single stake at the center of the excavation and include the radius of the site in the notification to JULIE. This single stake is to be white in color with the following information: excavator's company identifier (name, abbreviations, or initials) and the radius of the excavation site in black letters on the stake or with a notice attached to the stake.



Trenching, Boring or Other Continuous Type Excavations

Pre-mark in white paint the proposed centerline of planned excavation using 6" to 12" x 2" arrows, approximately 4' to 20' apart to show direction of excavation. The maximum separation of excavation pre-marks would be determined by site conditions but should never exceed 20'. Pre-mark lateral exca-

vations with occasional arrows showing excavation direction from centerline with pre-marks at curb or property line if crossed.



Non-Linear Excavation Pre-markings

Delineate in white the proposed area of excavation through the use of: a continuous line, dashes marking the four corners of the project or dashes outlining the excavation project. In lieu of paint, stakes, flags or whiskers, may be used. Limit the size of each dash to approximately 6" to 12" in length and 2" in width with interval spacing approximately 4' to 20' apart. The maximum separation of excavation pre-marks is to be reduced to a length that can be reasonably seen by the facility owner's locators when the terrain or excavation site conditions warrant it. Stakes, flags or whiskers are white in color with the excavator's company identifier (name, abbreviations, or initials) provided on the stake, flag or whisker.


