

JULY 24TH, SPRINGFIELD PLASTICS, INC.


During the past four years, membership meetings have been scheduled around Illinois in March, April, November and December to best

ILLINOIS AG LEGISLATIVE ROUNDTABLE REPORT

The Illinois Agricultural Legislative Roundtable met on January 26th in the CC Auditorium at the Illinois Farm Bureau in Bloomington at 9 am. The Roundtable is meant to provide an opportunity for participants to network, to receive timely updates on subjects and issues important to all of Illinois agriculture and to provide a platform for continued collaboration and education throughout the year. Dave Hurst, ILICA Area 3 director and Roundtable member, attended this year's January meeting and provided the following report of the day's events.

The reports mostly were about the general aspects of the financial issues in Illinois and their effect which was not real encouraging; however there were some issues not necessarily financial that we need to be aware of.

The Illinois Fertilizer and Chemical Association along with the Council on Best Management Practices introduced a new program that addresses the use of nutrients on corn and soybean applications and the resulting loss of nutrients that parallels the work that ADMC and Dr. Cooke are doing. The funding is not through the government so they are looking for research locations on their own within IEPA designated watersheds which fall in some of our contractors areas. The program is called **KIC2025** and is headed by Dan Schaefer, director of Nutrient Stewardship, Council on Best Management Practices. They already know the watersheds they are looking in and a website search will show the locations. They are looking to research the loss through tile outlets on existing and proposed drainage systems.

FFA addressed some proposed changes coming from the Department of Labor on Child Farm Labor Rule Impact, the proposed changes will affect any minor under the age of 18 on the farm making it illegal to do most of the tasks that they now do. As usual the proposed changes are not specific and there will be no way to know if rules are being violated until a complaint is filed and results of a hearing are out. There are a couple of congressmen working on this but didn't get their names.

Taxpayer's Federation of Illinois painted a bleak picture of the pension funding and projection on having to service the debt on just that.

We were asked to urge our legislators to push for the federal 2012 Farm Bill, it is feared the election will delay any progress to 2013.

They also discussed:

- The payroll tax
- HR872 pesticide permits
- Estate tax expiring
- The need to push for Ag transportation improvements, mainly on river locks.

There will be another Roundtable meeting in June but I don't know what goes on there since I've never been able to attend. Respectfully submitted: Dave Hurst





THE MILD WINTER AND COMMON VEGETABLE INSECT PESTS

What might a mild winter mean for vegetable insect pests? Does it necessarily mean that growers will see more problems? That largely depends upon how mild the winter has been, if the insect in question overwinters in our area, and if the insect in question overwinters above ground.


Has the winter been mild? Yes, the winter has been mild. The average temperatures for December, January, and February when added together total in the mid to high 90s. That is pretty warm, and for certain insects like the corn flea beetle, temperatures in that range have historically equated to excellent winter survival. So what about the other two components of the winter survival question? What about the questions if they overwinter here and where they overwinter if here?



For the sake of structuring that part of the discussion, vegetable insects will be divided into three categories – occasional pests, perennial pests, and severe pests.

Occasional pests are those that can create yield and/or quality issues given the right combination of circumstances and environmental conditions. Aphids, flea beetles,

grubs, cutworms, grasshoppers, and bean leaf beetles are probably the more common examples. Aphids, sap-sucking pests that emerge later in the growing season, are hard to classify as related to winter survival. They inflict more injury during hot dry periods. Many different species exist and they



Perennial pests are those that frequently cause yield or

quality losses. Examples might include asparagus beetles, cucumber beetles, loopers, cabbage worms, and leafhoppers. Leafhoppers, sapsuckers that burn the leaves, and loopers, green larvae that consume a



lot of foliage, overwinter in the south. In other words, central Illinois winter weather really doesn't influence their survival. Nor does our winter influence the survival of the spotted cucumber beetle which also overwinters in the south migrating into our area after the season has already begun. Cabbage



worms overwinter as pupae (cocoon-like stages) in above ground debris, striped cucumber beetles overwinter as adults in protected areas, and asparagus beetles spend the

winter as adults beneath residue. These latter three species will probably do well given our spring-like December, January, and February.

Severe pests are those that cause heavy yield and/or quality losses on an annual basis. Earworms/tomato fruit worms, hornworms, squash bugs, and the squash vine borer all come to mind. Hornworms, those troublesome feeders of foliage and fruit, and squash vine borers, those stem boring pests of cucurbits, tend to overwinter as pupae in the soil. The pupae of both overwinter rather shallow in the soil. A more typical winter that freezes the soil a few inches deep could reduce their number, but our mild winter has likely done little to both.



Squash bugs overwinter as adults beneath debris that is close to the field/garden meaning that a mild winter will likely allow many to survive. Perhaps the biggest "question mark" in severe pest sur-

vival comes in the form of earworms/tomato fruit worms. We typically think of this pest migrating back into Illinois from the south. After the arrival of adult moths, the resulting larvae

notch out fruit and devour the tips of sweet corn ears. However, they can also survive as pupae in southern Illinois. The lack of a hard winter might mean that more Illini earworms will survive. Could that mean an earlier start to the earworm season? Stay tuned.

USDOT BANS HAND HELD CELL PHONE USE IN TRUCKS - EFFECTIVE JANUARY, 2012

November 23, 2011 - WASHINGTON

U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood today announced a final rule specifically prohibiting interstate truck and bus drivers from using hand-held cell phones while operating their vehicles. The joint rule from the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) is the latest action by the U.S. Department of Transportation to end distracted driving.

"When drivers of large trucks, buses and hazardous materials take their eyes off the road for even a few seconds, the outcome can be deadly," said Transportation Secretary Ray La-Hood. "I hope that this rule will save lives by helping commercial drivers stay laser-focused on safety at all times while behind the wheel."

The final rule prohibits commercial drivers from using a hand-held mobile telephone while operating a commercial truck or bus. Drivers who violate the restriction will face federal civil penalties of up to \$2,750 for each offense and disqualification from operating a commercial motor vehicle for multiple offenses. Additionally, states will suspend a driver's commercial driver's license (CDL) after two or more serious traffic violations. Commercial truck and bus companies that allow their drivers to use hand-held cell phones while driving will face a maximum penalty of \$11,000. Approximately four million commercial drivers would be affected by this final rule.

"This final rule represents a giant leap for safety," said FMCSA Administrator Anne S. Ferro. "It's just too dangerous for drivers to use a hand-held cell phone while operating a commercial vehicle. Drivers must keep their eyes on the road, hands on the wheel and head in the game when operating on our roads. Lives are at stake."

While driver distraction studies have produced mixed results, FMCSA research shows that using a hand-held cell phone while driving requires a commercial driver to take several risky steps beyond what is required for using a hands-free mobile phone, including searching and reaching for the phone. Commercial drivers reaching for an object, such as a cell phone, are three times more likely to be involved in a crash or other safety-critical event. Dialing a hand-held cell phone makes it six times more likely that commercial drivers will be involved in a crash or other safety-critical event.

In September 2010, FMCSA issued a regulation banning text messaging while operating a commercial truck or bus and PHMSA followed with a companion regulation in February 2011, banning texting by intrastate hazardous materials drivers.

"Needless injuries and deaths happen when people are distracted behind the wheel," said PHMSA Administrator Cynthia Quarterman. "Our final rule would improve safety and reduce risks of hazmat in transportation."

Nearly 5474 people died and half a million were injured in crashes involving a distracted driver in 2009. Distraction-related fatalities represented 16 percent of overall traffic fatalities in 2009, according to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) research.

Many of the largest truck and bus companies, such as UPS, Covenant Transport, Wal-Mart, Peter Pan and Greyhound already have company policies in place banning their drivers from using hand-held phones.

Illinois Distracted Driving Laws:

- Ban on all cell phone use (handheld and hands-free) for bus drivers (Commercial Vehicles) (Primary law)
- Ban on all cell phone use (handheld and hands-free) for novice drivers (Primary law)
- Ban on texting for all drivers (Primary law)
- Illinois bans the use of cell phones while driving in a school zone or in a highway construction zone.

Note

A primary law means that an officer can ticket the driver for the offense without any other traffic violation taking place. A secondary law means an officer can only issue a ticket if a driver has been pulled over for another violation (like speeding).


[Company Name] Distracted Driving Policy

Please read the Distracted Driving Policy, sign and return to your supervisor.

In order to increase employee safety and eliminate unnecessary risks behind the wheel, [Company Name] has enacted a Distracted Driving Policy, effective [Date]. We are committed to ending the epidemic of distracted driving, and have created the following rules, which apply to any employee operating a company vehicle or using a company-issued cell phone while operating a personal vehicle:

- Company employees may not use a hand-held cell phone while operating a vehicle –
 whether the vehicle is in motion or stopped at a traffic light. This includes, but is not limited
 to, answering or making phone calls, engaging in phone conversations, and reading or
 responding to emails, instant messages, and text messages.
- If company employees need to use their phones, they must pull over safely to the side of the road or another safe location.
- Additionally, company employees are required to:
 - Turn cell phones off or put them on silent or vibrate before starting the car.
 - Consider modifying voice mail greetings to indicate that you are unavailable to answer calls or return messages while driving.
 - Inform clients, associates and business partners of this policy as an explanation of why calls may not be returned immediately.
- [Company consequences for failing to follow policy]

I acknowledge that I have received a written copy of the Distracted Driving Policy, that I fully understand the terms of this policy, that I agree to abide by these terms, and that I am willing to accept the consequences of failing to follow the policy.


