The ILICA office will partner with Brent by processing the re-



country do with old goats?" A spry old gentleman replied, "They put us on bus tours!"



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LEGISLATIVE UPDATE; CAP & TRADE COULD COST \$846 BILLION

When the House Energy and Commerce Committee approved the Waxman-Markey climate change bill last month

to reduce greenhouse-gas emissions, many from both political parties predicted it would impose huge costs on the American economy. According to the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) they were right.

The CBO, the official non-partisan "scorekeeper" of the Congress, has determined in a new analysis, that the so-called "cap-and-trade" system in the bill would cost American corporations, public utilities and the oil and gas industry \$846 billion over 10 years. The bill is the centerpiece of the Administration's energy policy.

Most of that money, all but about \$24 billion, would flow out from government coffers in the form of rebates of various kinds to affected industries, local power companies and refineries, among others.

The CBO report was a sharp reminder that the green-house-gas reduction plan would require an expensive, complex, government program to achieve its goals. Under this plan, declining federal greenhouse-gas limits would be coupled with a mandate on affected companies to buy annual emissions permits or allowances, from the government or through the marketplace. Companies could exceed their pollution target by buying additional allowances, or purchasing "offset" credits from approved

forestry and conservation projects. Companies that cut their emissions faster than required can save their excess allowances for future years, or sell them.



American Petroleum Institute

President Jack Gerard said the projected costs of Waxman-Markey will mean increases of as much as 77 cents a gallon for gasoline, and 88 cents per gallon for diesel. "This is what happens when market-based regulation is abandoned in favor of picking winners and losers," Gerard said. "Putting most of the burden on one sector also helps to explain why the legislation promises to be a job-killer."

Rep. Dave Camp (R-MI) said "Increasing Americans' fuel and utility bills in this recession is not only bad public policy, but it completely ignores the hardships millions of Americans are already facing."

Defeating this Wazman-Markey legislation in the heavily Democrat House is still considered to be an uphill climb. To my knowledge, LICA has not taken any formal position on this legislation, but if passed it is sure to affect every LICA member. LICA members with opinions on this legislation might want to write their Senators and Representative and express them.



BY-LAWS DUES STRUCTURE CHANGE PASSED

The recommended by-laws change, published in the last issue of the *ILICA News*, was brought to a vote at the summer members meeting at Rend Lake on June 27th. The proposed change was passed unanimously by the members present and is now in effect, altering the dues billing structure for 2010.

This change was two-fold: Active contractor dues will be billed at \$295 annually, eliminating the increase in dues after the second year. It also increased dues for our associate members to \$295, making both levels of member-

ship the same. Starting with the 2010 billing, which will include any contractor who signs up after September 1st, each year's membership will stay at \$295. Associate members that sign up through the summer will pay a pro-rated amount and then be billed for \$295 for 2010.

The committee is still working on topics for the educational sessions for this series, but more information will be available soon on the website.

IEPA AND AISWCD UNVEIL CONSERVATION PRACTICES AT DISTRICT HEADQUARTERS

Best Management Practices can reduce flooding, pollution and other damaging effects from heavy rainfall.


Illinois EPA Director Scott today joined Association of Illinois Soil and Water Conservation Districts' (AISWCD) Executive Director Rich Nichols, and other dignitaries to showcase best management practices that the Association has implemented in their own parking lot.

The Illinois EPA has been working with the AISWCD to improve the Association's "watershed footprint" to design its parking lot and driveway by incorporating a variety of Best Management Practices, including a porous pavement driveway, permeable paver parking lot, rain garden, and native vegetation in landscaping. The non-point source pollution prevention projects were funded from an award through the Clean Water Act Section 319 program administered by the Illinois EPA.

Along with urban area sprawl, we continue to add more and more impervious areas, such as parking lots, driveways, roads, sidewalks and turf grass. With this, we reduce the areas where rainwater can soak or percolate into the soil to become groundwater. All water eventually drains to the lowest part of a watershed and then into and out of the next downstream watershed, carrying the pollutants with it.

Located in the Sangamon River Watershed, water that falls at the AISWCD would previously have hit the pavement, run down the road into a ditch and eventually flow into the Sangamon River. Some of it might have been collected by a combined storm sewer and treated with other wastewater by the Springfield Sanitary District (adding to its load and treatment costs) then be discharged into the Sangamon River. From there it would flow to the Illinois River Watershed and then on the Mississippi River Basin and to the Gulf of Mexico, picking up pollutants along the way and carrying them along. It would also erode the streambanks.

With projects like the AISWCD parking lot of pervious material, rainwater is allowed to percolate into the soil, recharg-



ing our groundwater rather than adding pollutants and erosion-causing water to our rivers and causing damaging floods.

The Association also planted a rain garden, including Marsh Marigold, Fox Sedge, Swamp Milkweed, Black-eyed Susans, Blue Flag Iris and Monkey Flower. Rain gardens hold stormwater and allow it to slowly percolate into the groundwater system, lessening the stormwater load into our storm sewer systems and ultimately the creeks and rivers.

Since 1990, more than 300 non-point source projects have been administered by the Illinois EPA. Projects include developing watershed-based plans; controlling NPS pollution from agricultural lands, urban sources and construction areas; restoration of water quality, wetlands and stream channels and information/education programs.

Illinois EPA has partnered with the Association and its member county districts on a total of 12 Section 319 non-point source projects, totaling almost \$3 million in federal grant funds, for which the Association has provided \$2 million in match from state and local funding sources. Among the projects were:

- Protecting Water Quality in Urban Centers: This project maintained and improved water quality in urbanized areas by creating a partnership between soil and water conservation districts in 23 mostly urbanized counties across the state which implemented non-point source pollution prevention education and information projects aimed at local government land use decision makers and the development community.
- Watershed Planning: Under this project, the association acted as a liaison to soil and water conservation districts to assist local watershed groups in preparing or upgrading 10 watershed based plans to improve water quality by controlling non-point source pollution. Planning occurred in both urban and rural watersheds.
- Construction Site Inspection Program: Illinois EPA has contracted with 17 SWCDs covering 18 counties to conduct Phase II Storm Water Education and Outreach efforts. The project goal is to have soil and water conservation district staff visit construction sites to provide technical compliance assistance to site owners and contractors, using their erosion and sediment control expertise, and to keep construction site activities and stormwater discharges from negatively impacting the state by strengthening Illinois EPA's compliance assistance process.

SAFETY FEATURE - LOADING A MACHINE FOR TRANSPORT

Tips on proper methods of loading and securing machines and their components for safe transport. These are things that are known and practiced, but sometimes overlooked.

Before Loading

- Always read and understand the Operation and Maintenance Manual
- Always be sure to clean off rocks and debris from tracks and roller frames before loading
- · Check for fluid leakage
- Always measure your load
- Check and meet federal, state, or local regulations for height, weight, and width
- ALWAYS verify the trailer floor & tie-downs are serviceable


Measuring your Load

- Accurate weights and measurements are necessary to ensure the machine is properly placed or positioned on the trailer for transporting and to meet local and national highway regulations
- Machine height is most crucial
- Always be sure to use a measuring pole from the ground to the highest point on the machine
- Most North American roads have an allowable 13 feet 10 inches, (1.2 meters)
- Make sure you know your route so you can adjust for the correct height





Loading



- Always wear your seatbelt
- Eye contact should be maintained by the operator and all around the machine
- Keep anyone not involved in the loading away from the area
- · Make sure the machine is balanced
- Lower all work tools
- If work tools cannot be lowered, lock all work tools in their transport position (e.g. the center lock-pin for a backhoe loader)
- Lock the transmission in neutral and apply the parking brake
- Make sure the machine is off and key removed
- As a rule, you should use one chain for every 8500 pounds (3855.5 kg) of weight, or one chain for every 10 linear feet (3.1 meters) of cargo

ENJOY LIFE-INSTALL A FARM POND

A farm pond can add more than just a scenic setting to your land. It can be very practical and may even provide a little fun reports Bob Frazee, University of Illinois Natural Resources Educator. A farm pond is environmentally friendly in that it can capture runoff water, preventing it from doing erosive damage. It can also provide water for livestock, household use, irrigation, and fire fighting. On top of this, a farm pond can offer recreation—fishing, swimming, picnicking, ice skating, and wildlife habitat.

If you would like to create a farm pond, Frazee states the first step is to identify a suitable site. This means finding a site that has the right topography and an acceptable soil type that will provide sufficient water. The ideal topography is a wide, gently sloping basin with rather steep banks that would come closely together at the proposed dam site. The idea is to impound the largest amount of water with the smallest dam.

To construct the farm pond, Frazee recommends building a dam across an existing gully or low-lying area. Using a bulldozer or excavator, dig out a bowl-shaped basin above the spot where the dam will be located and then use the soil to build the dam. Within a year, the pond should fill with water.

The soil for a farm pond must contain enough clay to provide a watertight dam and a basin through which a minimum of water will seep. Usually 3 feet of clay soil is needed below the excavation level beneath the dam site and in the pond basin to prevent seepage. It may be necessary to haul clay for the dam from a nearby area. If there is not enough water-





tight soil for the entire dam, you may need to put a clay core in the center of the dam or install a prefabricated pond liner.

The watershed is the area surrounding the pond that drains into it. The ideal watershed will provide enough silt-free

water to keep the pond full at all times with water seldom running over the spillway.

A rule of thumb that Frazee recommends is to aim for about 20 acres of watershed area for every one acre of pond surface.

However, local conditions can alter this figure. If you have too much watershed area draining into the pond, you can move water away from the pond with terraces or diversions; and if you do not have enough watershed area, you can divert water toward the pond.

For successful fish management, Frazee states the gen-

eral rule is that ponds should have a surface area of at least 1 acre and 10 to 12 feet of water in 25 percent of the pond basin. Ponds less than 1 acre can handle relatively little pressure by fish populations. Also, if the water is not deep enough, fish can be killed by oxygen depletion during hot days in



the summer and when the lake is covered with ice & snow during the winter.





YELLOW JACKET NESTS IN HOUSES

All members of the nest, except the queen die during the winter, and fertilized females that overwinter in protected places start new ones each summer, states David Robson, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator, Springfield Center.

The young yellow jackets (larvae) feed on insects and other bits of meat that the adults capture or scavenge from garbage cans, picnics or other areas where food is left uncovered. The adults chew up the insects or other meat and feed this partially digested food to the larvae. Adults feed on nectar and the juices of the larval food.

Elimination of nests is best done at night when the yellow jackets are less active. Be sure to wear protective



clothing in order to minimize exposed skin to possible stings. Underground nests will usually have a single opening that the wasps use to enter and leave the nest. Ground nests can be treated by soaking the nest opening with a recommended insecticide. Seal the opening with soil immediately after spraying.

Wall void nests are frequently several feet from the wall opening that

wasps use to enter and leave the nest.

Thus, direct insecticide spraying involves the removal of part of the wall.

These wall void nests can also be killed by placing an insecticide dust in and around the wall opening. The yellow jackets pick up this dust on their bodies, groom themselves with their mouthparts and feed each other in the nest. Frequently, the insecticide dust must be reapplied up to four times over a two-week period.

Once the wasps have been killed, a few more may emerge from cocoons over the next few days, but these are



likely to encounter the insecticide dust and die also. Since the source of reproduction—the queen—has been killed, no more young will be produced. After two weeks have passed with no wasp activity near the nest opening, the hole may be sealed.

Caution! Do not confuse yellow jackets with bald-faced hornets, bees and beneficial wasps. These insects are considered friends of man because they feed flies and other harmful insects to their young and pollinate plants in the process of gathering nectar to feed them. Their nests should be allowed to survive in most situations.

If a person stays at least 3 or 4 feet away from the nest, hornets will usually not attack. Lawn work and other necessary activities close to the nest should be done late in the evening, when hornets are less active. Rarely will hornets sting while foraging for food.

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ILLINOIS FARM PROGRESS SHOW - ILICA Joins Partners In Conservation Tent - September 1 - 3, 2009







