We're returning to Decatur's Richland College for the August drainage workshop again this year. This venue provides our attendees with easy parking, great technical resources and, with the Farm Progress Show in Iowa this year, a newly remodeled hotel very close by with available rooms.

The agenda printed here is still tentative, but a more detailed itinerary will be available as the dates approach. Richard Cooke of University of Illinois Extension will facilitate the survey, design, DWM and bioreactor sessions of the class. The first day will cover survey and design basics like differential, laser guided and profile leveling, contour lines, longitude-latitude, GPS, soil properties & behavior and will also include the field session for laser surveying.

The second day will begin where day 1 left off on the drainage design and will conclude with an afternoon session on DWM and bioreactors. Optional ILICA certification will be offered following these topics on Wednesday afternoon. Additionally, Richard will present an optional Wednesday evening session from 5 - 8 pm on a new computer aided drainage design software he is developing. There is no additional cost for this session which will be best suited for drainage contractors who are already familiar with other computer aided design applications.

Please bring your grade pole and laser receivers for the

field portion of the workshop. Not everyone needs their own but there should be one for each small group during the field session. Also note that laptops will be VERY helpful for the all days of the workshop, but especially during the indepth drainage guide session and the optional evening class. If you would like a "loaner" computer during these sessions, contact Janet at the ILICA office to make arrangements. Please plan to dress accordingly (hat, sunscreen, raingear, etc.) for the field session on Tuesday. All sessions qualify for CEU's in the ILICA certification program.

Unfortunately, we have encountered a scheduling conflict for the advanced drainage class originally set for August 9th. With the already busy ILICA summer schedule, field days by other LICA chapters and other industry training sessions, there was no where to go that didn't create another conflict. This very popular day of GPS and machine control software review is going to be rescheduled and offered in conjunction with our January convention **or** our February workshop.



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DROUGHT CONDITIONS EXPANDING AND INTENSIFYING ACROSS ILLINOIS



Illinois State Water Survey (ISWS) Drought Update

Illinois is falling deeper into drought conditions, as agricultural impacts are now becoming much more evident and hydrologic conditions continuing to deteriorate. There is very little precipitation in the forecast at a time when substantial rains are needed to avoid agricultural damages. Although drought conditions are greatest in southern Illinois and parts of central Illinois, the area of concern is also spreading to northern Illinois.

Precipitation

Since the June 21 ISWS Drought Update, widespread rains of 0.5 to 1.5 inches fell in a band from the Quad Cities area to the Chicago area. Meanwhile, no significant rains fell over the rest of the state. The statewide average precipitation total from June 21 to July 3 was 0.5 inches, only 28 percent of normal. The statewide average temperature during this time was 78.0 degrees, 3.8 degrees above normal. Extremely hot weather occurred during the second half of this period with highs in the 90s and low 100s common across the state. At least 56 sites in Illinois broke their daily high temperature records on June 28 and 29.

The statewide average precipitation for June was 1.8 inches, which is 2.3 inches below normal and 43 percent of normal. It was the eighth driest June on record. June 1988 was the driest on record at 1.1 inches.

The statewide average precipitation for the first half of 2012 was 12.6 inches, making it the sixth driest on record. The first half of 1988 was slightly worse at 12.0 inches. The driest January-June was 1934 with only 10.3 inches.




Figure 1: Precipitation deficits for Illinois from January 1 - July 3, 2012

Statewide precipitation deficits since January 1, 2012, (Figure 1) have grown to 4 to 6 inches across northern Illinois, 6 to 10 inches across central Illinois, and 10 to 12 inches or more in southern Illinois.

Agricultural Conditions

According to the July 2 Illinois Weather and Crops Report, only 26% of the corn crop and 28% of soybeans are rated good to excellent, only about half of what was reported two weeks ago. The lack of moisture in the top soil continues to be a primary concern, with 89% of the soils in the State considered to have short to very short moisture levels. Conditions in southern Illinois are the worst in the State, with nearly all soils considered to be very short on moisture in both the topsoil and subsoil.

Streamflows




Figure 2: June 18 - July 1 average streamflow percentiles for Illinois.

Figure 2 displays streamflow conditions throughout Illinois for the past 2 weeks, with flows expressed as percentiles comparing this year's June 18-July 2 period to the same period for all years of record at selected USGS gaging stations. Most

streams south of I-80 are experiencing much-below normal flow levels (in the lowest 10th percentile for this time of year). The exceptions are the Kankakee River region and the western fringes of the State that have received greater amounts of rainfall over the last month. For the first half of June, most of Northern Illinois streams were experiencing flows in the normal range, but conditions have deteriorated such that most streams in this region are now considered below normal. Alt-

hough flows in many streams were below or much below normal for June, most of the current flow levels are yet close to their normal annual minimum levels. Thus, many environmental impacts associated with low stream levels have yet to be experienced this year. However, without substantial amounts of rainfall, stream levels will continue to fall in upcoming months.

Community Water Supplies

Over the past winter and spring, the levels at Canton Lake have been at their lowest since the 1988-89 drought, and over the past month the lake has been more than 6 feet below normal. However, as of June 20, the City of Canton now obtains its water from a radial collector well near the Illinois River, and is no longer considered vulnerable to drought impacts.

Water levels at most community reservoirs in Illinois have begun to fall from their full or nearly-full levels in late spring. Several community reservoirs are already between 1.0 to 2.5 feet below full pool. Although the onset of lake drawdown is occurring early in the season for most of these reservoirs, and is significant in that regard, most community reservoir systems in Illinois were designed to provide water through multi-year drought episodes typically lasting 18 months or longer. Thus, most systems will not experience severe drought impacts for many months to come; although in many cases it may be in the community's interest to begin reducing water use in anticipation that reservoir levels will continue to fall through this year.

The ISWS has identified only two community reservoir systems that could potentially be vulnerable to a severe drought lasting fewer than 12 months: Decatur and Danville. Of these two systems, the ISWS considers Decatur to be the most at risk of experiencing shortages during a record or near-record drought condition (www.isws.illinois.edu/data/ilcws/drought.asp), and Decatur will likely be the focus of water supply concerns over the next few months. Over the past month, the Lake Decatur level has fallen over 1 foot. At the current rate of decline, the lake will fall to an elevation of 613.0 by midJuly and, according to the City's Drought Action Plan, the City will then implement voluntary water use restrictions and begin tapping its supplemental groundwater supplies. In anticipation of the drought, Danville has raised their lake's pool level by installing flash boards on their spillway.

Shallow Groundwater

Communities that rely on shallow groundwater systems are also typically the first to experience drought impacts. Although the ISWS has begun receiving requests from water users looking for new sources of groundwater, we do not yet have specific reports of communities facing problems at this time or of water hauling. The ISWS is in the process of obtaining water level records for the end of June from its shallow groundwater well network. The well data received so far indicates a continued decline in all wells from last month, and several wells continue to record the lowest-ever June reading for their periods of record.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE: SOME REFLECTIONS ON THE FEDERAL "FARM BILL" Source: John Peterson, LICA

It has been interesting following the course of the Senate version of the Farm Bill, S 3240. From about 270 amendments that were offered initially, they allowed 73 to be debated on the

floor. They debated 26 on June 19th and had another 47 to deal with on June 20th & 21st. Final passage of the Senate Bill occurred Thursday, June 21st, on a 64-35 vote. In a news conference, Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee Chairman Stabenow (Sen. Pat Roberts, KS is the Ranking member) pointed to the flexibility built into the Conservation Title (Title II), when 23 programs are consolidated into 14 and placed in 4 major categories to make them less complicated and duplicative. NACD has been supportive of the Senate bill, focusing on the Conservation Title. That is also where I have focused as many LICA contractors work with farm programs.



One issue that was addressed in the Senate, but the amendments to deal with it were not passed, is the cost of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) which now provides food stamps to 1

out of every 7 Americans and costs \$4 of every \$5 in the Farm Bill, roughly \$80 billion/yr. Senate Agriculture Committee leaders in both parties wanted to trim a modest \$250 million from the program each year, but were rebuffed. The House is certain to demand greater food stamp cuts. We now spend as much on food stamps as we do to fix our nation's roads and bridges. Many newspapers suggest the title "Farm Bill" is a misnomer as most of the 1000 page bill no longer deals with farmers or ranchers. I have always disliked omnibus bills. There were over 2000 pages in Obamacare and now 1000 pages in the Senate version of the Farm Bill. How many Senators do you think actually read this bill and know what is in it?

Concerning the SNAP Program, even though we spend \$80 billion/yr on food stamps, we have no idea where or how that money is spent. The amount spent on food stamps has more than doubled in recent years, and the amount of food stamps laundered into cash has increased dramatically government statistics show. USDA administers the SNAP program in conjunction with the states, and contends that disclosing how much each store that is authorized to accept benefits receives in taxpayer funds would amount to revealing trade secrets. As a result, fraud is hard to track and the efficacy of the massive program is impossible to evaluate. USDA also has no idea what type of food the benefits are buying, even though the combination of universal bar codes and benefits cards

makes that entirely feasible. The USDA is notoriously secretive about who receives its money, relying on weak legal reasoning, said Steve Ellis of the watchdog group Taxpayers for Common Sense.

The House Agriculture Committee (Rep. Frank Lucas, OK, Chairman; Rep. Collin Peterson, MN, Ranking Member) will begin consideration of its version of the Farm Bill on Wednesday, July 11th. I expect the House to suggest even more cuts than the Senate did. As many have said before, the 2012 Farm Bill, if we get one, will be written in Conference. That could prove to be tense.

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SAFETY FEATURE: PORTABLE GENERATORS

Whether keeping the lights on at a jobsite or powering tools in remote locations, the portable generator has found its way into most industrial applications. Like any tool, it is important to know the hazards and limitations to prevent mishaps. Review some of the suggested safety tips below and see how safe your practices are around generators.

☐ Only run the engine outdoors with plenty of ventilation. Exhaust gases contain carbon monoxide, an odorless gas which binds to hemoglobin in the blood, preventing oxygen from being transferred to the body. Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning include dizziness, nausea and sleepiness.	Source: Safety.Cat.Com Discussion Date:
Always shut down the engine prior to making or removing connections.	Employee Participants
☐ Never attempt to move a running generator.	
☐ Always shut down the engine and allow it to cool before refueling.	
Never overfill the tank. Only fill within ½ inch from the top of the tank to allow for expansion.	
Make sure that hot exhaust gases are never directed toward anything flammable or explosive. Keep the generator at least 3 feet from any buildings or structures.	
☐ Consider using a spark arrestor over the exhaust if operating in an area of dry grasses, brush or forest.	
☐ Be sure you know how to stop the engine quickly in the event of an emergency.	
☐ Familiarize yourself with the sound output ratings of your generator and wear hearing protection, if required.	
\square Keep a fire extinguisher near the generator while it is in operation.	
☐ Never attempt to connect power to a building unless a licensed electrician has installed an approved transfer switch.	
☐ Test and reset the Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter monthly.	
Remove all electrical connections and the negative lead to the battery before attempting any type of service to the generator.	
☐ Always make sure the system is properly grounded before operating. Never connect the generator output neutral to the ground or frame. ▲	
☐ Know which parts of the generator become hot when running. These areas are not only burn haz-	
ards, but the involuntary jerk from touching a hot object could cause your hand to contact a high voltage area result-	
ing in shock.

DOES ANYONE KNOW WHAT ERA THIS TILING MACHINE WOULD HAVE BEEN IN USE?



This picture was sent to the ILICA office by Jay Mulholland, American Agricultural Drainage. I had hoped he would be able to provide more information about what period in our nation's history this kind of unit would have been in use, but he said the guy he'd gotten in from really didn't know much about it at all. According to an Ohio Park Service website I found online, "In the late 1830s and 1840s, Cyrus McCormick and Obed Hussey introduced improved reapers and mowers. In 1837, John Deere invented the first steel plow. It required only one man and a team of horses to operate. Prior to this, farmers used wooden mold-board plows that required three teams of oxen and two men to pull." Since it isn't evident from the photo whether teams of oxen or draft horses were being used to pull this, it could be an even earlier vintage. At any rate, it is a very interesting looking apparatus and if anyone has some insight on the time period, please let me know. I'll follow up in the next newsletter with any additional information I get.

Can you imagine putting in systems today with this kind of equipment? We've come a long way gentlemen!

The Land Improvement Contractors of America (LICA) applaud the Congressional House and Senate Agriculture Committees for their commitment to conservation.

The Land Improvement Contractors of America (LICA) applaud leaders of both the federal Senate and House Agriculture Committees for recognizing the significant value of conservation in supporting America's long-term environmental and economic stability. In language released in both their versions of the 2012 Farm Bill, the leadership in both political parties demonstrated strong bipartisan support for locally-led soil and water conservation efforts.

"We fully recognize the need to get our nation's financial house in order, and we understand that means cuts in federal programs," said LICA President Merlin Welch of the California LICA Chapter. "We are very pleased that the federal committee leadership has developed a balanced plan that recognizes the critical value of local leadership at the landscape scale. The two Farm Bills propose about a 10% cut over 10 years, approximately \$6 billion, to Farm Bill Title II Conservation Programs (the Farm Bill has 11 titles). That is more than the ill-fated super-committee proposed in 2011, and even more than

what the agriculture share of the federal budget represents, about 2%. LICA hopes other aspects of society bear their fair share of the federal budget cuts, as agriculture and conservation have demonstrated they will do."

"Investing in conservation simply makes sense," Welch continued. "Not only do Farm Bill conservation programs play a key role in supporting clean water, air, and healthy, productive soils, they also help producers avoid unnecessary regulation, and support our nation's long-term economic and food security. As we face increased pressure to produce food, feed, fuel, and fiber for a growing population, we simply cannot afford not to invest in natural resource conservation." The federal Farm Bills have always had strong bipartisan support.

LICA's members in every state appreciate their opportunity to provide input throughout the legislative process. Specifically they are pleased to see bill language that: 1) protects critical conservation program funding, and 2) supports program consolidation for increased efficiency and ease of use for producers. LICA has always supported locally-led, voluntary incentives-based approaches to conservation delivery through our nations Soil & Water Conservation Districts.



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
