

SECRETARY PERDUE NAMES NRCS CHIEF

WASHINGTON, December 3, 2018 - U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced today the appointment of Matthew J. "Matt" Lohr to serve as Chief of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources

Conservation Service (NRCS). In his role, Lohr will provide leadership for NRCS and its mission to support America's farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners in their voluntary conservation efforts through a network of over 3,000 offices in communities nationwide.

"Matt has committed his entire life to the betterment of agriculture," Perdue said. "The knowledge and experience he brings to the table will help ensure our locally-led, science-based approach continues to offer farmers the conservation solutions needed to enhance their environment and commercial viability."

Lohr, raised on a century farm in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, now owns and operates Valley Pike Farm, Inc., with his wife Beth and their six children. Prior to his appointment by the Trump Admin-

istration, Lohr held public office, serving in the Virginia House of Delegates from 2006-2010. In 2008, Lohr was awarded Legislator of the Year in honor of his work as an ambassador for economic and community development in Virginia. He then served as Virginia's Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services from 2010 to 2013. More recently, Lohr worked as Knowledge Center Director for Farm Credit of the Virginias, a customer-owned financial cooperative that provides resources and education outreach to local farmers and

> the community. And since June 2017, he has been farming full time on the family operation, which includes poultry, beef cattle, row crops, and sweet corn.

> "I am honored and humbled to serve America's agricultural industry in this new capacity," Lohr said. "As a 5th generation farmer, I care deeply about conserving and protecting our most valuable agricultural resources. I look forward to the chance to lead this valuable agency and assist our producers nationwide with their conservation practices."

> NRCS, through voluntary natural resource conservation programs, works side-by-side with producers, local conservation districts, and other partners to protect and conserve natural resources and build sustainable farming solutions through soil conservation on private

Winter is in full force. As the days get shorter and the nights get colder, even the best of us can get a little down. The "winter blues" are characterized by the mild depression, lack of motivation, and low energy that many people experience during this cold season. Luckily, there's a lot you can do to both prevent the blues from coming on and get yourself back to normal if they're already here.

1. Exercise

As if we needed another reason to get fit! Exercise isn't only for maintaining your weight and staying healthy. It's great for relieving the stresses of life. Plus, the effects of a good workout can last for several hours after you hit the showers. You'll have more energy throughout the day, and your metabolism with stay elevated too. Exercise also helps your mind by releasing those "feel good chemicals" that improve your mood.

2. Eat a Healthy Diet

What and when you eat has a great affect on your mood and energy. Avoid refined and processed foods (like white breads, rice, and sugar). These foods are not only devoid of the nutrients your body craves, but they zap your energy levels and can affect your mood-causing depression, lack of concentration, and mood swings. But alcohol is actually a depressant, and rather than improving your mood, it only makes it worse. Avoiding alcohol when you are already depressed is a good idea. Moderate drinking is fine for most people, but binge drinking (defined as having 5 or more drinks in one sitting) is never a healthy choice. The morning after will have you feeling sick, depressed, and even more tired, which will affect many aspects of your life. This will make your low energy and "winter blues" even worse.

6. Treat Yourself

Having something to look forward to can keep anyone motivated. Winter seems endless! But if you plan something exciting, your mood improves when you're anticipating it and when the event actually comes. Plan something that's exciting to you-a weekend trip, a day at the spa, a party (but keep #5 above in mind), or special event like a play, girls (or guys) night out, or sporting event.

7. Relax!

You're busy! Work, class, family, friends, appointments, meetings-even if you enjoy being busy, everyone needs some time off. Don't be afraid to say "No" to extra opportunities (covering a shift for a co-worker, bringing food to your son's class party). Try to spend a few minutes each day doing nothing! Read a book or magazine, sleep in on the weekend, go to bed early, try some

meditations, or take a yoga class. Relaxation, especially in the form of yoga, can alleviate stress and leave you with a calm energy. Mental exercises like meditation and positive thinking can help keep

depression at bay.

8. Embrace the Season

Instead of always avoiding the cold and the snow-look for the best that it has to offer! Take up a winter sport like ice skating, snowboarding, hockey, or even sledding! Enjoy these

opportunities while they last-after all, they're only here a few months per year. Staying active will boost your energy. Seeing winter in a positive light, with all the fun activities that it has to offer, will keep your spirits high.

9. Get Social Support

Don't underestimate the power of friends, family, mentors, coworkers, and neighbors. Who can you turn to when you're down and need a pick-me-up? Keep a mental list of these special people and don't be afraid to ask for help or encouragement when you need it. Something as simple as a phone call, a chat over coffee, or a nice email or letter can brighten your mood.

10. Catch some Zzzz's

People naturally want to sleep a little bit more during the winter. But with all we have going on, sometimes sleep is the first thing to go. With a little time management, and some self-discipline, you can meet your shut-eye needs. Aim for 7-8 hours each night, and try to keep your bedtime and waking time consistent. 

HOW FAR APART, HOW DEEP? UNDERSTANDING THE INFLUENCE OF TILE DEPTH AND SPACING ON NUTRIENT LOSS AND CROP YIELD

One of the major nonpoint source pollutants in Illinois, as in other parts of the Midwest, is nitrate-nitrogen. Concentrations of this chemical in drinking water supplies for several Illinois communities periodically exceed the Federal drinking water standard of 10 mg-N/L. High nitrate levels have also been linked to environmental problems as hypoxic zone in the Gulf of Mexico every summer. One of the main source of nitratenitrogen in water bodies in the region is from agriculture. It has been estimated that Illinois contributes about 17% and 13% of the total annual flux of nitrogen and phosphorus, respectively to the Gulf, mainly because of the widespread use of subsurface (tile) drains.

Tile drainage improves crop yields on poorly drained soil and helps reduce year-to-year variability in crop yields. However, they can act as preferential pathways that transfer contaminated water directly to water bodies without this water being subjected to soil processes that attenuate nitrate concentrations. There are some 10 million acres in Illinois that are tiled, representing 35% of the total agricultural land in the state. Most of this tiled acreage is located in the so-called "tile-shed," a 22county region generally bounded by I-80 on the north, I-70 on the south, I-55 on the west, and the Illinois/Indiana boundary on the east. It is, therefore, not much of a surprise to find that high nitrate concentrations have been found in the drinking water supplies of communities such as Decatur, Georgetown, Danville, and Bloomington. It has been also noted that the tiledrained watersheds in Illinois contribute much larger nitrate yields than the non-tiled, southern Illinois watershed.

The Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS) calls for actions to reduce the state's nitrate and phosphorus loads to the Mississippi River by 15 and 25%, respectively, over the next decade. While the overall conclusions are clear - sweeping measures may be required across the majority of corn-soybean acres if these ambitious reduction goals are to be met - at the individual farm scale, many questions remain. The scientific complexity of nutrient losses remains poorly understood and many growers feel they are being asked to change their operations and reduce nutrient inputs without a clear understanding of how specific recommendations will influence outcomes. Because the need for proactive efforts is greater than ever, the next few years represents a critical opportunity to engage the agricultural community in science and outreach activities that will help define the success of the NLRS.

Farmers know the importance of tile drainage, but what can we learn by understanding tile depth and spacing? It turns out we can learn quite a bit from how these factors influence soil water dynamics. Illinois Nutrient Research and Education Council (IL-NREC) funded a research project to investigate how tile depth and spacing variations influences nutrient losses and crop yield in East-central Illinois earlier this year. Drs. Rabin Bhattarai and Richard Cooke from the University of Illinois lead the project. In the past, there have been few studies that investigated the impact of tile spacing and depth on water quality from tiled fields and their impact on the crop yield, but the results have not been conclusive. There have not been any comprehensive studies related to tile depth and spacing on nutrient loss and crop yield conducted in Illinois.

This project is be the first of its kind to quantify tile drainage nutrient losses for different combinations of tile depth and spacing while also assessing potential agronomic and environmental tradeoffs that have not been previously considered. The researchers also plan to develop a drainage design tool that will provide an optimum solution for minimizing the nutrient loss, while enhancing crop production goals. Tiling was completed in a 30-acre farm earlier this year with help from ILICA member (figure 1).




Figure 2. The layout of the installed tile-drained fields and monitoring stations. CS-1, CS-2, CS-3, CS-4, CS-5, and CS-6 are a monitoring station to collect water samples and gauge tile flow for CF-1, CF-2, CF-3, CF-4, CF-5, and CF-6, respectively.

The 30-acre field is divided into 6 sections, each about 5 acres in area. There are two replicates of three sections with various depth and spacing combinations (40 ft spacing at 3.5 ft depth, 60 ft spacing at 2.5 ft depth, and 80 ft spacing at 3.5 ft depth). A water management structure equipped with a v-notch weir was also installed at the outlets of the tile drain systems (Figure 2). This is first year of 3-years long study.

At the end of the project, we expect to answer the following questions:

Do current tile drainage design primarily provide a quick pathway for water to leave the fields and decrease the yield variability, but have negative impacts on nutrient losses?

How does changes in tile depth and spacing impact nutrient losses and crop yield?

SAFETY FEATURE: PREVENTING HEARING LOSS

If you are exposed to loud or excessive noise while on the job, making sure you wear hearing protection is crucial to preventing hearing loss.



Can you hear as well as you used to? Many workers complain they cannot, and statistics show that they are right. According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), noise-induced hearing loss is one of the most common occupational diseases, and is the secondmost self-reported occupational illness or injury. Many workers are

often exposed to noises loud enough to cause permanent hearing loss. It can happen slowly over time, so it may not even be noticeable.

The time to be concerned about hearing loss is before it starts. Hearing loss is permanent. The good news is that hearing loss is preventable with the right protection.

The Facts

To protect yourself in the workplace, you need to be aware of the noise levels that can promote hearing loss and to take steps to avoid or reduce them as follows.

- According to the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), workplace noise is likely to be hazardous if:
 - You have to raise your voice to talk to someone who is an arm's length away.
 - After leaving a noisy place, your ears are ringing or sounds seem dull.
- Experts recommend wearing ear protection when regularly exposed to 85 decibels of noise. For comparison's sake, this is less than the noise output from average traffic, most power tools, a shotgun blast or rock concerts.
- Be sure to wear hearing loss protective equipment consistently.

If you suffer from hearing loss, you may become more isolated at work because you will have trouble hearing and communicating with others. This can put you at a higher risk of accidents and injuries. If you are not able to hear warning signals or shout-outs from your co-workers, you may not be as aware of hazards or danger as you need to be.

It is up to you to protect your hearing on the job by participating in personal protective equipment (PPE) training and complying with our hearing loss prevention program by wearing your hearing protection, as required.

Types of Hearing Protection

The louder the noise, the shorter the exposure time needed before hearing protection is required. From earmuffs to simple plugs, there are a variety of sizes and styles to choose from, based on your personal preferences and comfort level. Some of the most common types include:

- Single-use ear plugs, which are self-forming and, when properly inserted, work as well as most molded earplugs.
- Pre-formed or molded earplugs, which are individually fitted by a professional, can be disposable or reusable. Reusable plugs should be cleaned after each use.
- Earmuffs, which are ideal because they form a perfect seal around the ear. Be aware that glasses, facial hair, long hair or facial movements, such as chewing, may reduce the protective value of earmuffs.

Hearing loss can debilitating and is irreversible. Taking precautions in the workplace today will help to protect you against hearing loss tomorrow.


