USING SOLAR ENERGY TO ENHANCE DENITRIFICATION IN WOODCHIP BIOREACTORS DURING WINTER

The intensification of agricultural food production in the Midwestern USA had led to daunting challenges to achieve agricultural sustainability. One of the concerns in agricultural operations is water containing nitrogen (N) and phosphorus (P) entering tile drains, which, when released from fields, can degrade water quality.

To reduce nitrate loads from agricultural fields in Illinois, the Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy and Nutrient Reduction Strategy Policy Working Group have developed strategies and management practices based on science and best-available technology to target the state's most critical watersheds. For nitrate from tile drainage, the use of woodchip bioreactors is one of the recommended practices. They are relatively inexpensive, reliable, require low maintenance, and easy to install. Researchers at the University of Illinois have been at the forefront of the characterization of bioreactor performance and developing design standards. Despite woodchip bioreactors showing promise in reducing nitrate loads from agricultural drainage water, the challenge of relatively low removal performance of these bioreactors under low-temperature conditions during the winter season remains hard to overcome. The performance of the woodchip bioreactor during winter needs to be improved, especially in terms of increasing system temperature, which is a key element in bioreactor performance. In Illinois a large percentage of annual drain flow occurs in winter and spring. Research is being conducted to enhance nitrate removal from the bioreactor in these colder months.




Figure 1. Schematic of heated bioreactor installation.

The layout of a system on the university's South Farm for testing the effectiveness of heated bioreactors is shown in Figure 1. Water from the field is channeled into two bioreactors, one of which the water is heated. The water is heated by pumping water from the outlet structure through chambers heated by parabolic solar energy concentrators and returning the water into the inlet manifold. The pump is powered by solar energy. The system is instrumented to cap




Figure 2. Elements of the heated bioreactor installation.

the water temperature in the bioreactor at 15°C (60°F). This cap is adjustable. Pictures of several elements of the system are shown in Figure 2.

Figure 3 shows an example of the relationship between temperature and nitrate removal rate in a bioreactor. At the South Farm installation, the bioreactor water temperature fluctuates. It averages approximately 10°C (50°F) and does not go below 5°C (41°F). If the temperature is increased from 10°C to 20°C the nitrate removal rate would more than double.

A simulation model was used to estimate the effect of increasing the average temperature in the South Farm bioreactor. The model estimates that the annual nitrate load removal would be increased from 4.1 lbs/acre/year to 7.5 lbs/acre/year or 11 lbs/acre/year, respectively, if the bioreactor water temperature were increased to 15°C




Figure 4. Simulated cumulative removal of nitrate at different mean temperatures in the South Farm bioreactors.

(59°F) or 20° C (60°F), as shown in Figure 4.

The experiment will be conducted for two years. Over this period, the actual performance of the system, and the cost of cost/benefit ration of the system will be determined.

Leadership Award

For consideration of the

ILICA Leadership Award, nominees are judged on their dedication and loyalism to the Association; their willingness to share and impart their knowledge and expertise upon others within and outside of the Association; and their professionalism, business ethics, and ideological representation of the construction industry.

Jon Seevers personifies all of the above and, over the years, has led the association by serving on several committees and chairing a number of these; serving as a Director on the Board in his area for many years; serving as Vice President; and serving on committees at the National level, where he has been or is currently serving as chair for one or more of them.

A member since 1984, Jon has been a leader in Illinois LICA for over 40 years, though his family-ties within the Association run much deeper, and he has personally received numerous Merit Awards, the Shiny Shovel Award, and the Mr. Contractor Award in 2015.

Innovator Award

The Innovator Award recognizes individuals that stand out for their visionary or trendsetting contributions to conservation. Innovator award recipients are highly aware of their conservation responsibility as a landowner, partner, or ILICA member. They are strong conservation supporters and promoters that are "early adopters" or innovators actively involved in the betterment of the conservation industry. They recognize the value of partnership and are willing to work with various interests for the optimization of resources and conservation promotion.

The 2023 Innovator Award was received by LaVerne Weber, Grade Solutions, for leveraging his geotechnical passion and expertise to find water management solutions for a diverse list of clients from commercial food & beverage processors to HOAs to farmers. While water management services now comprise a majority of his business, his company also offers site development & road construction. In fact, prior to founding his current company, LaVerne was part owner of a fly ash company during the early days of the product's beneficial introduction into the pavement industry.

Today, his innovation runs deep and is evident in all the projects he develops and the materials he tests, or even develops himself, for quality control, such as the custom water control structures he builds for his subsurface irrigation and water reuse systems that utilize commercial wash water from food & beverage processing facilities for ag production. LaVerne serves on his local HOA's Lake Commission and works diligently to improve the water quality of the lake through the education of landowners, water testing, and installation of water quality practices such as bioreactors. Many of these bioreactor systems are alternate designs he is developing and working on with researchers for practicality and improved efficiencies, including in-ditch, surface flow bioreactors and raised bed bioreactors. One of his current projects involves working with a local community college to develop a facility for the ag department that has several research plots with subsurface irrigation that will be plumbed through their education building to utilize a city water source and to allow for fertigation. And to give you a sense of LaVerne's passion for innovation, he might be the only person you know that uses grade control and a GPS design with a rubber tire dozer to maximize outdoor silage storage piles for a client, which not only creates the prettiest silage pile you've ever seen but also actually significantly increases the feed



SAFETY FEATURE: DEFENSIVE DRIVING TIPS

Being a defensive driver entails utilizing various road skills to defend yourself against potential accident hazards. Using proper defensive driving techniques will help keep both you and other drivers safe on the road. With this in mind, be sure to implement the following defensive driving guidance the next time you get behind the wheel.

- Eliminate distractions. The first step in being a defensive driver is to reduce distractions while you drive. As such, it's important to make sure the road is your sole focus—avoid using your cellphone, adjusting the radio, programming your GPS, eating, drinking or applying makeup behind the wheel.
- Remain alert. In addition to eliminating distractions, it's vital to be fully aware of your surroundings on the road. This practice will help you better detect upcoming hazards, allowing you to respond as quickly and safely as possible. Check your mirrors often, and try to scan road conditions approximately 20 to 30 seconds ahead of you. Specifically, keep an eye out for other drivers, nearby pedestrians and road obstructions (e.g., traffic cones or construction work).
- Follow the rules of the road. This includes wearing your seat belt, obeying speed limits, using your turn signals and avoiding driving with excess passengers in your vehicle. Also, make sure you approach intersections with caution—never run a red light or stop sign. Even if you have the right of way, look around to confirm it's safe to cross the intersection before doing so.
- Avoid aggressive driving (and drivers). Aggressive habits—such as switching lanes frequently, braking or accelerating suddenly, and tailgating other drivers—can increase your likelihood of being involved in an accident. Try to be as predictable and forgiving as possible by always leaving at least a four-second distance between you and the vehicle in front of you, avoiding abrupt lane changes and keeping a steady pace. If another driver is displaying aggressive habits, try to distance yourself from them or pull over when it is safe to do so.
- Be extra careful in adverse conditions. In severe weather (e.g., heavy rain, snow and fog), road conditions can be significantly more dangerous. Take additional precautions by reducing your speed, increasing your following distance, braking earlier and using your headlights.

Don't Forget to Take Care of Your Vehicle

Even the most defensive drivers could contribute to an accident on the road if operating an unsafe vehicle. Make sure you keep your vehicle in good shape by taking it for routine oil changes and fluid checks, ensuring the tires are properly inflated and performing other maintenance as needed.
